AIR FIRMS TO GET CONTRACTS

By Melbourne Christerson, Associated Press Staff Writer. (By Guardian's Special Wire) WASHINGTON, March 7.—President Roosevelt today proposed return of the United States air mail to commercial companies as soon as possible under new legislation providing for "honest payment for honest service."

In a letter to chairman Kenneth McKellar and Meade of the Senate and House Postoffice Committees and chairman Hugo Black of the Senate Investigating Committee Mr. Roosevelt said: "Enactment of legislation along the lines I have suggested will establish a sound, stable and permanent air mail policy."

Some were postponed until May on account of the attorneys on the cases being in attendance at the Provincial Legislature at Charlottetown. Other cases were put off until next August term on account of the illness of the parties. Two cases were heard, namely: Frank Frazee vs. Charles Johnson; and Augustus Ahearn vs. Fred Ramsay. The former case was for breach of warranty on the sale of a cow. Judgment was reserved. The latter case was for damages for the taking of a horse alleged to belong to the plaintiff. In this case several witnesses were examined and there was considerable conflicting evidence. Judgment was given for the plaintiff. Argument was heard in the case of McDougall vs. Bernard, being an action for the price of an automobile. The evidence in this case had been taken in December last. Mr. C. M. Matthews for the plaintiff filed a written argument, and Mr. Wilfred Tanton for the defendant presented his argument orally. Judgment was reserved. The Court adjourned to meet on May 29th and 30th, to which date several cases have been set down for trial.—S.

SCOTLANDYARD BAFFLED BY GOLD MYSTERY

Well Guarded Gold Shipment From South Africa Replaced With Cement.

(By Burdette Johns, Associated Press Staff Writer) (A. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) LONDON, March 7.—Plainclothes men from famous Scotland Yard and police in Tarasay Cape Town were called in today to solve the mystery of a box containing 90 fine ounces of gold when it left South Africa and nine cents worth of cement when it reached London.

Their problem had many elements of a detective yarn. Police knew that the box had gold in it when it started for London, that during the trip it was in a strong room that was not opened enroute, and that police themselves watched it hawk-like when it was transferred from Southampton by train here.

New Racket They saw in the mystery a new kind of racket which has sprung up as a result of the flight of gold to the United States.

The discovery by bank attendants that the gold—worth \$32,300 when it left Cape Town—was missing showed that the gang had done some careful research in how the precious metal is shipped.

The box had been re-sealed so that its outside appearance was exactly the same as that of other boxes in the cargo. Cement nails substituted for the gold bars had been so precisely weighed as to correspond to the merest fraction to the hijacked gold.

The route followed in the shipments from South Africa made the racketeers' job difficult.

Well Guarded The gold, after being weighed and boxed at the mines, was placed in a van locked by special contrivances and conveyed to the ship under a special guard.

It was locked in the ship's strong room during the entire trip. Then it was checked and rechecked under the vigilant eye of police and dock officials when unloaded.

Bank officials, who seemed put out by the occurrence, said only that "the whole matter is in the hands of Scotland Yard," while word from Cape Town said police were trying to determine whether the robbery took place there.

went direct from this tame spot to James Bay, thus giving the Indians and Eskimauks the tamest opportunity. We are quite certain that two or three were killed by them within three days after they left here. One goose, tagged and liberated here on April 24th, was killed at the Belcher Islands on the 28th; another, liberated on April the 22nd, was killed at James Bay on the 26th.

On two different occasions when the geese were leaving here at five p.m. I telegraphed the C.P.R. agent at Stralax, Ontario. Stralax is about sixty miles north of my home. On both occasions I got returns before nine o'clock the next morning. My first reply was "Geese are crossing at Stralax." The next year, under similar conditions, the reply read, "Geese are passing at Spanish Forks and at Pogmasing." These three stations are on the main line of the C.P.R., about seventy to ninety miles north-west of Sudbury. At these three particular points the railroad is running nearly straight north, and I doubt very much if the geese would be over miles out on their northern trip the two different years.

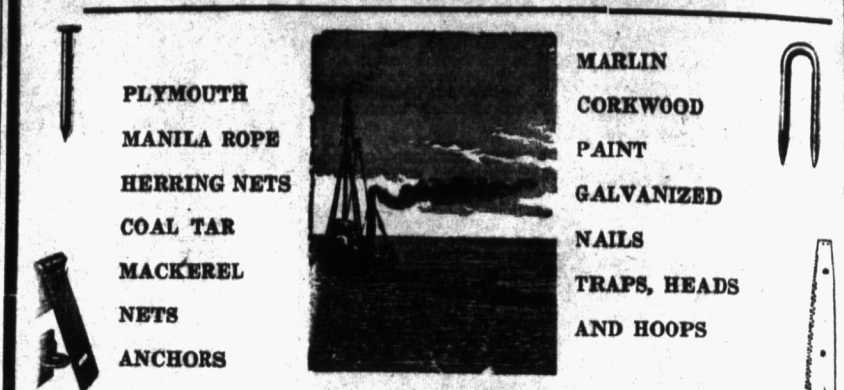
During the same period of time I have a lot reported from their winter home along what I called the south-east Atlantic Coast.
