THE MARKET—Yesterday was fairly well attended with the demand exceeding the supply; the tables being cleared at 11 o'clock. What was offered was of a very superior quality. The large varieties of chicken, fowl, beef, lamb, bacon and ham met with excellent favor, and the buying was brisk. New potatoes appeared in the market for the first time, and were a splendid size for this time of year. There was a great deal of new cabbage on hand and sold at 10c per head. A large variety of string beans, parsnips, beets, turnips and other vegetables were for sale. Old potatoes were in great demand with no supply. The Square was almost deserted, with only a few loads of hay and a number of young pigs for sale, the latter selling at \$9.00 to \$10.00 per pair. Butter sold at 32c to 34c per lb; eggs, 25c to 26c according to grade. Beef, lamb, ham, bacon and other meats sold as previously quoted. Although a nice line of fish was offered in the fish market, the demand wasn't as great as in the early season; chicken, fowl and especially lamb, which the Charlottetown market is famous for, being more to the customers' taste and liking.

Smaller States Holding Back

(Canadian Press) PARIS, Aug. 7.—How to make guarantee treaties between two or more nations harmonious with the proposed general pact for mutual assistance, which will be suggested to members of the League of Nations in an effort to bring about reduction of armaments, is giving some trouble to the temporary committee of the League of Nations sitting here.

Disinclination of the smaller states to join in the general pact which might bring them to take part in a blockade is the principal obstacle to it. The larger nations, which are most exposed to danger from exterior say they cannot leave themselves in a position where abandonment by them of the smaller powers might compromise action otherwise likely to protect them from aggression.

Hence the insistence of France for partial guarantee pacts. The representatives of the smaller states have been joined by Italy in their demand that parties to such partial pacts shall take action in case of threatened war only after the country has decided whether there is cause for action. On the other hand France and Great Britain are agreed that parties to the regional or partial treaties cannot wait in case of dire menace for the council to act. The discussion is expected to require another day or two at least.

Ralph Simpson Is Still Missing

(Canadian Press)

NEW GLASGOW, Aug. 7.—That there was a possibility that Ralph Simpson was alive, was the hope held out last night after another day's search. Simpson, a Canadian National Railway employee, has been missing since last Tuesday night. A witness was found who remembers seeing the missing man walk down Abercrombie Road which leads off Sinclair's corner. It was here that Simpson and a companion named Macdonald were set down by another man named Grant who had taken them in his car when their own broke down on the New Glasgow, Stellarton road. A Mrs. Clyburn living on Abercrombie Road stated that a man answering very much to Simpson's appearance, even to his clothing and couple of front gold filled teeth came to her house about noon Wednesday. He seemed in a confused state of mind, she said. He said he thought nobody lived in the house, and after some general talk, walked away. Further down the road a farmer reported seeing a man answering somewhat to Simpson's appearance walking down the road on Sunday last. He gave evidence of being in a deranged state of mind.

Meantime the dam where Simpson's car was found is being drained off and should be empty early tomorrow morning. It is probable that the East River will be drained.

The reports from the railway men with whom Simpson worked all indicate that he was a man of exemplary character, and was not known to have previously indulged in liquor.

To Withdraw Troops From Sydney

(Canadian Press) SYDNEY, N. S. W., Aug. 7.—Steps are being taken by Colonel Eric Macdonald for the early disbanding of the provincial police. It is reliably stated. Up to a late hour yesterday no orders for the withdrawal of the troops had been received but it was expected that Ottawa would soon be notified by the local authorities that their presence is no longer necessary.

POLICE SWIM THROUGH STREET TORRENTS

BIRMINGHAM ENGLAND, Aug. 6.—Terrifying experience befel many Birmingham families on Saturday night during one of the most severe storms the city has known.

To the flash of lightning and the long roar of thunder, men, women and children were rescued by police and members of the five brigades who waded or swam to houses which had been flooded by torrential rain.

Hockley Brook, which in ordinary times is hardly more than a trickle, had swelled to such an extent that water was leaping up from the banks into the backyards and gardens of many small houses, and so rapid was the onslaught that the inhabitants had not time to make their escape by the ground floor doors.

All they could do was rush to the upper rooms and await rescue. The danger was keenly realised, for only three years ago the same district was flooded, and in that instance two children were drowned. Houses which had then been made untenable by the floods, were utterly demolished on Saturday.

Fortunately, police and firemen hurried to the scene with ladders, and there were many exciting and some very pathetic rescues.

Paralyzed people unable to help themselves and invalids were treated as gently as possible but as the water in some lower rooms had reached a depth of five to six feet the rescuers had to make all speed possible.

In one house a family of five climbed through the windows of the first floor to an adjoining house by means of a rope rigged up by firemen, and by means of ladders they were then able to reach the ground and find shelter with friends.

In some streets the water was four to five feet deep, and here the police swam across and brought back trapped women and children. In these cases it hardly need be possible to reach houses in any other way, but the police lost no time in discussing methods of salvage, and while the rain continued to pour with tropical force, while lightning lit up the scene and thunder roared, those who looked from windows of houses close by saw uniformed men swimming across the streets with people whom they had rescued.
