

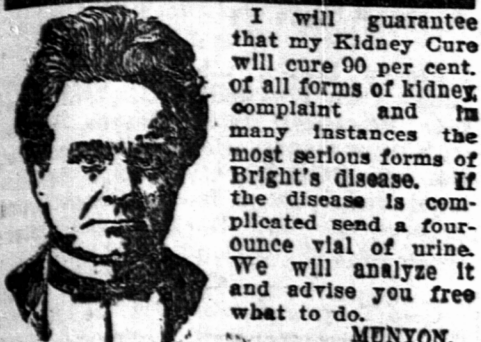

CANADIAN ECHOES

The Anglo-American Commission Adjourns.

MONTREAL, Dec. 17.—[Special]—The Star's Washington despatch states that the Anglo-American Commission have decided to adjourn to January 5th. There is now a prospect for a reciprocity schedule being arranged.

Prospect of Reciprocity Improves—Hudson Bay Route Reported Useless—Paul Brown's Case—A Marriage Question—Big Steamship Deal.

WINNIPEG, Dec. 17.—[Special]—The report of James Fisher, who accompanied the government expedition to Hudson Bay, declares the route for commercial purposes absolutely useless.

OTTAWA, Dec. 17.—[Special]—The case of Paul Brown, negro, under sentence of death, is being considered by the cabinet and it is probable a respite will be granted for further investigation as to his sanity.

TORONTO, Dec. 17.—The provincial Attorney General's department having been asked for an opinion on the subject, has decided that a marriage ceremony performed in Canada by a minister resident in the United States cannot be recognized under the laws of this country.

MONTREAL, Dec. 17.—[Special]—A big transaction in steamships has been completed. The Beaver line, which has been in financial difficulties for some years, has disposed of its plant to the Eder-Dempster Co., which company has bought the entire fleet of the Beaver line and will now occupy the berth in the harbor to which it is entitled by reason of its great business.

WOMAN SENTENCED TO HANG.

ST. SCHOLASTIQUE, Quebec, December 15.—The jury in the case of Cordella Viaw accused of murdering her husband, Isidore Poirier, of St. Canut, Quebec, in November 1897, tonight brought in a verdict of guilty and the court at once sentenced her to hang March 10. The prisoner was greatly effected when the sentence was pronounced. Parslow, who it is said killed Poirier, at the wife's instigation, will now be tried. The defence will attempt to prove irresponsibility, claiming that he was hypnotized by the woman.

BOSTON, Dec. 15.—The aldermen elected on the full returns of the city election are: Wilbur F. Adams, Rep.; Wm. Barwin, Rep.; Franklin L. Codwin, Rep.; John H. Colby, Rep.; Edward W. Presto, Rep.; David F. Barry, Dem.; Edward W. Dixon, Dem.; James H. Doyle, Dem.; Patrick F. McDonald, Dem.; Frank J. O'Toole, Dem.; George U. Crocker, Rep.

The common council will stand 31 Republican and 44 Democrats. This is a gain of two for the latter. This vote of the city on license was 34,134, yes; 24,258 no.

BRITISH TIDINGS

The Queen and Court Go to Osborne.

LONDON, Dec. 17.—[Special]—Particulars of the loss of the steamer Clan Drummond in the Bay of Biscay show the Lasers in the crew fought like demons and lost all discipline. Many lives, including that of the captain, were lost because of their fighting.

Lascar Crew of a Sinking steamer Fight Like Demons—Captain and Many Others Lost—Two British Steamers in Collision, 20 Drowned—Lord Salisbury Speaks.

The Queen has transferred her court from Windsor to Osborne, Isle of Wight.

The Prince of Wales has summoned a private meeting at Marlborough House to make war against tuberculosis. Lord Salisbury and a number of prominent medical men will take part.

NEW CASTLE, Dec. 17.—[Special]—The British steamer Pierre Mont has been in collision with the British steamer Ilios, in the North Sea.

The latter foundered and the former is badly damaged. It is believed that 20 persons are drowned.

DUNNETT HEAD, Scotland, Dec. 17.—[Special]—The Danish steamer Thingvalia passing here to-day, signalled that she had on board the crew of the British steamer Yovina, foundered at sea, Dec., 11th.

LONDON, Dec. 17.—The Marquis of Salisbury, at a banquet given last evening in his honor, devoted his speech to home affairs and to general principles for the conduct of the foreign policy, without any direct reference to any particular question.

Dwelling upon the necessity for discussion, Lord Salisbury said it would be a relief if he could discuss and explain certain matters that had been and were being grotesquely misrepresented; but this he could not do without betraying his duty. The government, he continued, should be judged, not on individual items, but on the success of a policy as a whole.

The Fattening of Cattle.

In 1894-95 feeding tests were continued for a comparison of the cost of fattening steers on a bulky-fodder ration composed of,—

(1.) Indian corn ensilage, roots and hay.
(2.) Robertson mixture ensilage, roots and hay.

Eight steers were divided into two groups as nearly even as possible. The following shows for the whole period of 24 weeks, 19th December to 5th June, the cost per 100 lbs. of increase in weight while the animals were being fed on the different rations:—

Indian corn ensilage, roots and hay, Groups I. and II: total increase in weight, 876 Lbs, cost per 100 lbs of increase \$9.95, Robertson mixture ensilage, roots and hay, Groups II. and I 851 Lbs. \$7.75.

Conclusion.—From the test it appears that:—The cost for feed consumed per 100 lbs. of increase in live weight was 27-1 per cent greater on rotation No. 1 (Indian corn ensilage, roots, hay and meal) than it was on rotation No. 2 (Robertson mixture ensilage, roots hay and meal.) From Prof. Robertson's Report.

U. S. HAPPENINGS

General Gomez Reported to Be Dead.

NEW YORK, Dec. 17.—[Special]—Rumors are current here concerning the retirement of Dr. Parkhurst from the pastorate of Madison Square Presbyterian church, as the result of a proposition for consolidating the church with that of Fourth Avenue.

Awful Destitute and Diseased Condition of Thousands in Havana—General Lee Arrived—Dr Parkhurst to Retire—President McKinley Visits the Atlanta Jubilee.

General Lee is again in Havana for the first time since the war.

Richard Howland has sailed for home from Cuba. His investigation shows there are at least 30,000 practically destitute persons living in hovels and affected with all kinds of loathsome diseases in Havana.

Yellow fever is in the lower part of the city.

MADRID, Dec. 17.—[Special]—It is reported from Havana that General Gomez is dead.

ATLANTA, Ga., Dec. 17.—President McKinley attending the Peace Jubilee here was warmly received.

The ovation given the President at the Capitol yesterday by the members of the legislature was the greatest reception ever given an American citizen in Atlanta, and his speech having relation to the care of Confederate dead has fired the hearts of Southerners with admiration for the chief executive.

General Joe Wheeler is cheered at every step, and Generals Lawton, Young, Oates and other army officers are heartily received at each appearance.

The feature of the day was the civil and military parade, which passed through the streets during the afternoon.
