NEW WHITE STAR LINER REPUBLIC WAS DISABLED

An Unknown Vessel Rammed Her—Wireless Messages Scattered Broadcast Over the Fog Enshrouded Ocean—Many Liners and Cruisers Soon Hurried in Search of the Ship—Found by Steamer Florida.

NEW YORK, Jan. 24.—(Special)—Two hundred miles from Port speed- ing eastward through a dense fog, the magnificent new White Star liner, Republic, was rammed by an unknown vessel Saturday morning.

Captain Sealby's only chance lay in wireless telegraphy and hurried appeals for help were scattered broadcast over the fog enshrouded ocean.

The Republic's wireless equipment failed before the steamer was completed and definite reports are unobtainable during the rescue work, as the Florida is not equipped with wireless.
