SIMULTANEOUS ELECTIONS.

From the days when honest Alexander Mackenzie led the Liberal opposition in the first House of Commons down to the Liberal victory in 1896 no point in the Conservative practice was more strongly and persistently condemned by the Liberal leaders than the bringing on of by-elections at different times when there was more than one vacancy. To the Liberal party belongs the credit of having made provision for simultaneous polling in general elections, and the leaders of that party always contended that the same principle ought to be applied to by-elections when there were more than one vacancies existing. If we remember rightly Mr. Mackenzie, when in power, always followed the rule that he had laid down in opposition, and brought on the elections to fill all vacancies at one time.

Quite recently a despatch was sent out from Ottawa, purporting to give the Secretary of State, Hon. R. W. Scott, as authority for the statement that the by-elections would be brought on simultaneously. The despatches in yesterday's afternoon papers, mentioning only the three by-elections in Prince, Lambton and Simcoe, gave to many an impression that the government had departed from that sound principle. Our fuller despatches tell that five of the six vacant seats will be filled by pollings to be held simultaneously on 14th December. This, if it does not entirely comply with the established rule, comes pretty close to it.

THE OPEN DOOR.

However little we may have been the impression produced on other great powers by Lord Salisbury's policy of the "open door" in the far east, it is gratifying to note that reports say it will be adopted by the United States in the Philippines, and perhaps in the West Indies as well.

It is significant that the two great Anglo-Saxon powers are now shaping their policy so much along the same lines, and in a manner that must challenge the approval of the world for its unselfishness. All the commercial nations stand to profit by the open door policy, which Britain maintains wherever she plants her flag. The fact that the United States, hitherto very exclusive in trade matters, now falls into line so far as her new possessions are concerned, affords another reason for believing that the two governments have had an understanding since the beginning of the war with Spain, of a more important character than the world has suspected. At least the Anglo-Saxon team seem to be pulling together in a manner that is quite unprecedented, and leaves nothing to be desired except that they may keep it up to the end.

The late elections give the Republicans a majority of 15 in the new House of Representatives, as compared with 47 in the former House. The Senate will probably show a clear Republican majority over all of 20, as compared with 2 in that body as it stood before. But the election in another way was a close one, giving the Republicans control of but 21 state legislatures out of 41 in which elections were held.

There is no question of more vital importance to the cities of the Dominion than that of their large and increasing taxation and how it is to be met. Mr. J. W. Martin of London is now delivering a series of lectures in Canada showing that the true solution is to be found in the cities owning and operating their own water, gas, electric light and street railway systems. Mr. Martin cites by name 200 cities that own and manage their own gas works, while a less number manage their electric lights and street railways, in almost every case with better service and reduced taxation. The time is past when valuable street franchises may be given away in the reckless fashion of earlier years.

The Pall Mall Gazette is of the opinion that a war with France would be rather a good thing. In effect it says: "Our trade might suffer momentarily, but we would gain much in the end. We would close up all French ports and seal up the Channel. We would sweep away French trade, and take at our leisure such French colonies as we think worth taking. We would regulate our position in Egypt, relieve Newfoundland of the French, make a present of the New Hebrides and New Caledonia to Australia. We would overthrow the present boundary of Siam put an end to French ambitions in China, divide West Africa as we choose, and have something to say in Morocco," etc.

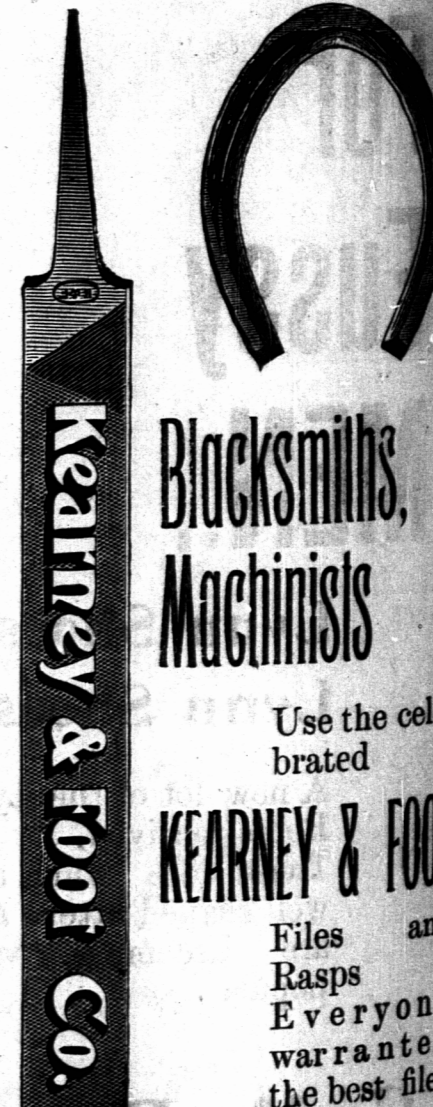
