MR. BRYAN AGAIN.

William Jennings Bryan, twice defeated as a candidate for the Presidency of the United States, will in all probability be again selected as the Democratic candidate for that position. At least his name is persistently kept forward, and the prospect of his candidacy seems to be accepted by leading newspapers of all political colors. This is the more remarkable from the fact that the free silver platform on which he came to the front, is now utterly discredited and relegated to oblivion.

The Springfield Republican is of course politically opposed to Mr. Bryan, but admits that the movement in his favor is spontaneous and growing while the New York Press, also Republican, says that Mr. Bryan is today stronger than when he ran for the Presidency and that his strength is rapidly increasing. The fact is that except for his former financial heresy Mr. Bryan is a good man and an able one, and is moreover a singularly magnetic orator. The masses have confidence in his integrity, and his stalwart opposition to the trusts and monopolies strikes a popular chord. It seems possible that Mr. Bryan may yet be President of the United States.

President Roosevelt have become famous for epigrams, such as "the strenuous life," "the man with the muckrake," the latter adapted from Bunyan. One of his latest is "the man with the patch on his breeches." "This is the day," he says, "for the man with the patch on his breeches to come forward, and for the man of the dollar to go to the rear." Many a worthy man has worn patches on his clothes and worn them with honor. A patched garment is more honorable than an overdue and unpaid tailor's bill, of which there have been too many in the world. It is to the credit of the great President that he took thought for the man with a patch, and invites him to a front seat.

THE ALBANI CONCERT.

A great musical event was the Albani concert last evening, a brilliant success in the exquisite treat afforded to all lovers of high-class music and another triumph for the great Canadian prima donna. It means more than this, however, to the people of our city and Province. They demonstrated last night that it is practicable to bring to our shores an artist of the foremost rank and give to an entertainment of the highest class such an auditory and such appreciative recognition as has been hitherto thought only to be possible in much larger cities. This means much for us in the future. We may hope to have hereafter more entertainments, musical and other, of a higher and better class than we have hitherto enjoyed. And for establishing this condition of things the credit is wholly due to Mr. Spencer, who brought Madame Albani here, to charm all hearts with music that has delighted the royal and the great in distant lands.

A correspondent, who says he is preparing a list, wants to know whether the names of women may be included among the twenty famous Islanders. Certainly, they may. A woman who is native to the Island, or who resides within its bounds is an Islander. And for that matter a woman is a man, although a man is not a woman. Man was created "male and female."

Fifteen large and destitute families from Bristol, England, sent out by that city, arrived in Toronto the other day without enough money to buy a meal for themselves, and became at once a charge upon the poor fund. The regulations against pauper immigration seem not to be very well observed. We cannot afford to pay Atlantic Trading companies \$5 per head for "settlers" of this class.

Some astonishing facts have been brought out by an inquiry of the Interstate Commerce Commission between the coal-carrying railways and the shippers. It appears that bribery in its worst form prevailed, that men doing business with these roads had to pay well for "favors" or take their chance of being ruined. One official of the Pennsylvania Railway had received \$300,000 in this way and other officials smaller sums, because they saw that certain persons were supplied with cars when they wanted them. Our cousins across the border are having a general "clearing up," in which the railways, the packing houses, Standard Oil and other trusts are receiving a good deal of very much-needed attention.

ORDINATION OF A. D. MCKENZIE

SYDNEY, June 1.—A. D. McKenzie, B.D., was ordained to the Presbyterian ministry and inducted into the assistant pastorate of St. Andrew's church, this city, at a public meeting of the Sydney Presbytery held in that church Tuesday evening. There was a large congregation present despite the heavy downpour of rain, and the proceedings of the ordination and induction were watched with the greatest interest. Rev. A. J. McDonald, president, ordained and inducted, Rev. D. M. Gillies preached an able sermon from the text, Mark 11, 10, "The son of man hath power to forgive sins," and the clerk, in the regretted absence of M. Campbell, Gabarus, who was the pastor in the home congregation in P. E. I. of Mr. McKenzie, gave the charge to the minister, and Rev. John McKinnon, Louisburg, addressed the congregation.

At the afternoon meeting of the Presbytery the call of Rev. John McIntosh, of Hopewell, to the congregation of Boularderie, which is signed by 800 addresses, was considered and it was decided to transmit the same to the Egerton Presbytery. The call of Caledonia, Pictou county, to Rev. J. H. Hattie, of Bras d'Or, was laid on the table at Mr. Hattie's request.

The Presbytery will meet at Loch Lomond to induct Rev. Mr. Fraser into the pastorate of the church at that place. Rev. J. A. Greenlees takes the place of Rev. Mr. McKinnon of Louisburg, as the preacher.

INCREASE OVER FOUR MILLIONS

OTTAWA, June 2.—The customs receipts of the Dominion for the month of May shows an increase of \$508,585. For the eleven months of the current fiscal year that have now elapsed, the collections totalled \$42,111,310, an increase of \$4,286,193 over the corresponding period of the previous twelve months.
