Farmers Convention Last Evening

LIMESTONE AND GOOD ROADS SUBJECTS UNDER DISCUSSION

In the Prince of Wales College last evening the meeting of the Central Farmers Institute gave place to a meeting dealing mainly with "Good Roads" at which the Commissioner of Public Works, Hon. C. W. Crosby presided.
The first part of the meeting was taken up with the subject "Limestone for Fertilizer." Mr. Reid of the Department of Agriculture explained the limestone operations at Miminigaash showing how the limestone being taken there contains 85 per cent of carbonated lime and the great benefit it has proved to the farmers in that locality. He also dwelt on the possibilities of enlarging this industry here and of importing limestone from New Brunswick.
Mr. H. H. Shaw, Provincial Engineer gave a very interesting talk dealing with the subject of improved highways, particulars of which it is impossible to give in this issue.

Supreme Council In Conference

PARIS, Jan. 25.—The supreme Council composed of representatives of Great Britain, Italy, France, Belgium and Japan heard the military experts and later conferred together, regarding the failure of Germany to disarm provided for by the Treaty of Versailles. The experts asked to make a detailed report of the subject with recommendations regarding the measures to insure the execution of the disarmament clause of the treaty.

beat of the day" pass off the stage of action, those following may be able to take up the burden more efficiently and effectively than their predecessors were able to do. In conclusion I wish to refer to one more thing viz: the absence of the fakirs at our Provincial Exhibition last fall, I think the management is to be commended for this and I believe it should and will have our hearty approval, and I trust we have seen the last of this most objectionable feature of our Provincial exhibition.

The following nominating committee was appointed: Messrs E. L. Simpson, Elphinstone Mutart and W. H. Gibson.
The address was on motion discussed clause by clause and finally adopted as read.
On the clause dealing with freight rates and transportation Mr. Sanford Phillips, O'Leary, somewhat severely censured the railway management, instancing difficulties encountered at O'Leary station in connection with the shipment of live stock. The difficulty, he stated, was largely due to the fact that the standard gauge had not yet been extended to that part of the country. They had approached the authorities on the matter of securing better shipping facilities and were promised recess but nothing had yet been done.

The matter of co-operation, in the third clause elicited an excellent speech from Mr. James McGrath of St. Louis. He strongly urged that the Canada Farm Products be supported as it has machinery and the management to carry co-operation to its logical conclusion. The only hope of our farmers, he said, was in co-operation and, with that co-operation directed as it is in the Canadian Farm Products, and as it could be in that concern if given wider opportunities, the general prosperity of the province would be safeguarded. Mr. McGrath's remarks were warmly applauded.

The matter of Seed Fairs brought a good speech from Mr. Peter Brodie, M. L. A. He spoke strongly of the good work done by the original seed fairs held in Summerside and conducted by the farmers. He deprecated the fact that the management of the said fairs had been taken out of the hands of the Farmers and put in charge of the Government.

The adoption of the clause relating to schools and teachers salaries was moved by Secretary McKenzie. He expressed the opinion that the principal difficulty with the educational system today was the inadequate pay to teachers. This he said must be remedied if improvement is to be expected.
Mr. H. R. Rogers, Superintendent of Education seconded the adoption of the clause in an excellent speech.

Closing Session Of Provincial Dairy Association

The closing session of the Provincial Dairy Association was held yesterday with Vice-President J. A. Dewar, M. L. A., in the chair. The advisability of supporting the National Dairy Council came up for discussion, the following delegates speaking for their various districts: Messrs. Stamford Phillips O'Leary; A. J. Montgomerie, Tyne Valley; D. J. Thompson, Tryon; Adam Brown, New Glasgow; and Inspector F. T. Morrow.

A resolution, moved by E. Howatt, French River, seconded by Jas. O'Connor, Kensington, was unanimously adopted. That 1-2 cent per 1000 pounds of milk be levied on factories for support of P. E. Island Dairy Association and 25c per patron for support of National Dairy Tax.

The following resolutions were also passed: To Mrs. Frank Lang, Tryon, P. E. I. The Dairyman's Association in convention assembled in the City of Charlottetown wish to express its sincere sympathy in the great loss you have sustained in the death of your husband.

This Association feel that it also has lost a true friend who had not only the best interests of his own community but that of the whole province at heart.

Resolved—That this Association pay the butter and cheese makers out of its funds the expenses incurred by them in coming here.

Resolved—Because the cow owners in many sections of this province have not yet become educated to the necessity of feeding a liberal ration in order to secure the best results from their cows we recommend that members of Cow Testing Association who will sign a contract to feed two cows as directed by a representative of the Dairyman's Association and keep a complete record of feed and production be guaranteed against losses by this Association provided that the cows to be fed shall be chosen, and that stables, feed and records be at all times open for inspection to a representative of this Association.

That this Association is in sympathy with the plan to provide a dairy school at Truro equal to that at Ontario Agricultural College, Guelph, Ontario.

That this Association wishes to express its thanks to the principal of Prince of Wales College for the use of this building for the meetings of this Association and to the press for the publicity they have given to the work of the Dairyman's Association.
