Year of Tremendous Activity for R. C. A. F.

(By JOHN SUTTON (Canadian Press Staff Writer) OXFORD, Jan. 7. (CP) - A stripping grown into wings giant, the R.C.A.F. soared to an unprecedented action peak in 1944. It was a year of ever-increasing Allied intensity against Germany and Japan, and Canadians, either in their own right or as part of R. A. F. units, spread to every new base on operations as the enemy gave ground. For each man in the more than 40 purely Canadian squadrons in the war theatre, 10 other Canadians served in British units.

Phenomenal successes of Canadian fighters on the western front, as the shooting down of 82 German planes in five days during the late September battle for the Ardennes highground, took headlines in the British press. Canadian bombardier, FO. Walter Daniel of Rivers, Man., was probably the first to smash the giant Nazi battleship the Tirpitz when she was sunk in a daring daylight raid last November. He was one of nearly two dozen Canadians on the raid.

The year brought hundreds of decorations to the R. C. A. F.'s first Victoria Cross of this war—a post-humous award to Flight-Lt. David Hornum of Mimico, Ont. who died sinking a Nazi submarine after his flying boat had been severely damaged.

Night After Night The year began impressively when the Canadian bomber group formed part of a force which struck Berlin on New Year's night. Night after night, the group dared steadily worse flying weather and fierce opposition to smash German industrial centres.

Canadian Spitfires and Mosquitoes, based on Britain's south coast, began laying D-Day plans last spring when the emphasis moved from long-range bombing to more immediate tactical considerations.

Outstanding unit of those pre-invasion sweeps was the city of Edmonton squadron from the wing commanded by English fighter ace, Wing Cmdr. J. E. (Johnny) Johnson, triple D.S.O. and double D.F.C., who by late autumn had 38 kills. The Edmonton shot down 126 German planes, a feat which won them the honor of being the first Allied fighter unit to move to a continental field behind the Allied armies.

Balance from previous year, \$40.88. Balance on hand, Nov. 30th, \$38.87.

C. C. F. Candidate Nominated for Grey North Contest

OWEN SOUND, Ont., Jan. 8. (CP) - Air Vice-Marshal A. E. Godfrey, retired R.C.A.F. officer, on Saturday accepted nomination as C. C. F. candidate to contest the Grey North riding in the Federal by-election Feb. 8. He will oppose the Liberal candidate, Defence Minister, McNaughton, who is making his first venture in the political field, and the Progressive Conservative nominee, former Mayor Garfield Case of Owen Sound.

Accepting the nomination, Air Vice-Marshal Godfrey advocated "a just and effective program of total mobilization for an all-out war effort."

The campaign in the three-party election, called as a result of the ill health and resignation of the former Liberal member, W. P. Telford, is expected to swing into action this week. Mr. Case opened his campaign with a speech at Shallow Lake Monday night, while it is understood Gen. McNaughton will enter the riding Thursday to open his campaign.
