Livestock Report

(Canadian Press) MONTREAL, April 17.—Receipts of livestock on the two markets for today's selling amounted to 108 cattle, 63 sheep and lambs, 940 hogs and 2,755 calves, with a couple of cars to be unloaded.

Canner cows sold for \$3.00 to \$3.75, cutters \$4.00 to \$4.75 and common bulls sold for \$5.50 and \$6.00. There was no good cattle sold. The run of calves was the greatest of the season to date and prices broke accordingly. Early sales were made at \$8.50 to \$9.75 for straight lots medium and fairly good suckers and one of the best loads was sold for \$9.00. The poorer calves were very slow moving, \$7.50 to \$8.00 was being offered for common to just ordinary kinds, and around \$7.00 for thin ball fed kinds. The bulk of the common calves were sold at time of writing, from a \$6.00 to \$10.00 each and sheep \$8.00 and \$9.00. Hogs were steady. Bulk of sales \$10.00 to \$10.15 and a few good quality lots were at \$10.25. Nearly all sales were on a flat basis and to local butchers.

Commission Back

LONDON, April 17.—Sir John Simon, and his colleagues on the Royal Commission on Indian Reforms, have arrived in London from India. Interviewed after landing at Folkestone, Sir John expressed his belief that the Commission's visit had done a great deal of good. It now was in a much better position to undertake its main task. Whatever might be said about the strength of the boycott on its activities in India, the Commission was now assured of the good will and co-operation of important sections of the Indian public.

AFTERNOON SESSION
 The House resumed at 3:10 p. m. The consideration of the Fish and Game act was continued. Hon. W. M. Lea went on to explain subsection (a) of Clause 3. Mr. Allan Stewart moved that in subsection (c) of Clause 3, which extends protection to marten, otter, mink, muskrat and coon between the first day of April and the first day of November of each year, the word "coon" be struck out. His motion was agreed to. Clause 31, which had occasioned some discussion was allowed to stand as read. On motion of Mr. Russel Clark, the license fee mentioned in the clause for non residents was reduced from \$15.00 to \$5.00. Clause 34 was also amended so as to read "Game Inspector" instead of "Tax Collectors" in the first line of the clause. Clause 34 is as follows: "The Tax-collectors of the several districts of this Province are hereby empowered to issue Game Licenses and Angler's Permits on the forms supplied by the Provincial Treasurer. The said Tax-collectors shall make monthly returns to the Provincial Treasurer of all monies received for Game Licenses or Angler's permits and shall retain as compensation five per centum of the fees they collect under this Act. Mr. Seully was of the opinion that there should be a limit placed on the bag of partridge to be taken. He suggested five. Mr. MacPhee agreed with him.
