Austria to Have Team in Olympics

PARIS, Dec. 12.—Austria will be represented in the 1924 Olympic games, her official entries for the winter sports at Chamonix having been received by the French Olympic Committee today along with those of Latvia and Hungary.

Austria will send a hockey team to compete in the contests and will also have entries in the figure skating, consisting of both women and men.

Latvia will compete in the speed skating contests at all distances and the 50 kilometers ski competition. Hungary has entered the ski events from 12 to 18 kilometers and also the jumps.

The entries received today bring the total representation at Chamonix to seven countries—the United States, Belgium, Czechoslovakia, Sweden, Hungary, Latvia and Austria.

BAKERSFIELD, Calif., Dec. 12.—James J. Jeffries, former heavyweight champion of the world, has accepted an offer to train Luis Angel Firpo. Jeffries' contract to train Firpo is said to call for remuneration of about \$75,000.

Seattle Hockey Player Dies

CALGARY, Dec. 12.—Foley Martin, Calgary Tigers' hockey player, died in Seattle yesterday, according to a wire received last night from Fred Johnston, president of the Tigers, in Seattle.

Martin who was 23 years old, died of double pneumonia and blood poisoning.

Besides being one of the best hockey players developed in Western Canada, he was an all-round athlete.

He began his professional hockey career when the Western Canadian League was formed in 1920, and played sensational hockey for the local sextette. When Lloyd Turner, last spring, started to gather a collection of hockey stars together for this season, Martin was the first player to be handed a contract.
