Daily War Survey

(Canadian Press)
Reports from the Finnish war bring three rather definite indications which Finland's weakness in air power is being corrected to some extent as Russian aircraft range over Finland dropping bombs by the thousand without discrimination as to objective.

From Havel, Norway, the arrival of 11 United States-made pursuit planes, destined for Finland, has been reported. The Finnish air force has attacked a Russian harbor, Russian motor lorry columns and Russian railway stations. Out of an estimated 200 Russian aircraft which raided Finland in a single day 20 were shot down.

Air power assumes increasing importance in the Finnish war as spring approaches. Military experts are more or less agreed the country is unsuitable for large scale operations except in winter when the lakes, marshes and rivers are frozen.

If the Russians are stopped on land in the winter they may be unable to continue a land offensive until the spring. The Finnish will tell against them. They will be nothing to war them from carrying on the warfare from the air. The round except a growing Finnish air force.

The Italian planes and pilots sent to Finland early in the war, are reported to be giving a good account of themselves and the Finns have pilots to fly the United States planes now on their way they should be a welcome addition.

FREDERICKSBURG, Va. Jan. 30.—(CP)—Court Clerk Mason H. Willis who knows whereof he speaks says the proverbial blushing bride has vanished as completely as the dinosaur.

Since January, 1939, when Fredericksburg became the quick-marriage centre of the east, Clerk Willis has met more than 2,000 brides. He says he has yet to observe a blush.

Many present-day brides actually take the leading role in pre-marital arrangements. Nine times out of 10, Willis avers, it is the bride-elect who writes or telephones here for first-hand information on Virginia's marriage laws. And just as often she answers all the questions Willis is required to ask before issuing a

licence—even those pertaining to the name, age, occupation and percentage of her intended.

"And don't you know," said Willis, "every now and then the women pay for the licence."

Willis' only explanation of this transformation is that most women who elope to Fredericksburg are "beyond the blushing age." His statistics reveal that the average Fredericksburg bride is 27, and the groom 30.

But the unblushing brides are honest, Willis says they give their ages without addition or subtraction. Even those who are five to 10 years older than their would-be mates admit their age.

Though Willis doesn't subscribe to the theory that marriages are made in heaven, he takes every reasonable precaution to be sure that
