THE TROUBLE IN CHINA.

All the great powers have an interest in the trouble which the Boxers are making in China and Britain, Russia, the United States, Germany and France have landed marines from their warships to protect their national interests and their people. But of them all Britain has by far the largest commercial interest, as nearly three-fourths of the foreign trade of China is in her hands. The situation is greatly complicated by the fact that the Empress Dowager of China, who is the autocrat of the Empire, is more or less openly the friend of Russia, while refusing to take any energetic measures to suppress the Boxers.

Russia is the one power which has already a strong body of troops in the far east—probably 100,000 men—and there appears to be some suspicion in England that the Dowager Empress may invite Russia to land an armed force to assist in protecting the Chinese capital. The feeling is that if thus invited Russian troops would be quickly on the ground and the occupation once made would become permanent. The trouble seems likely enough in the end to hasten the much talked of partition of China.

There is yet another month of the Canadian fiscal year to be heard from, but the reports for eleven months give indications that the aggregate trade of the Dominion may reach a figure nearly, if not quite \$50,000,000 in excess of last year, and last year was a record maker.

Boston laments the fall of the famous old elm tree on her Common which was blown down by the gale of a few days ago. It was of great size and age—just how old no one can say, but something older than Boston itself. The elm was located as a conspicuous object on a map of Boston issued in 1722. Ann Hebbins was hanged from one of its limbs for witchcraft in 1656, and that was 344 years ago. The tree must have been of some considerable age at that time to bear such fruit.

The rather surprising statement is made on apparently good authority that France produces annually two thirds as much wheat as the United States and more than any other country. The order in which the wheat-growing countries rank in productiveness is as follows:—United States, France, Russia, Austria-Hungary, Argentina and Canada. France alone produces more wheat than the entire continent of Asia. It is surprising that an old and thickly populated country like France, with an area less than one of the larger American States, should find it profitable to raise so much wheat. The fact affords evidence alike of the excellence of French agriculture and the richness of her soil.

THE EDITOR'S MAIL.

The City Lighting.

SIR,—I was pleased on reading the Examiner of Friday evening to see that some one has at length realized the fact that there seems a strong probability of our city having foisted upon it again the old played out, broken down and out-of-date system of street lighting with which our city has been afflicted for many years.

There are many rumors in the air and very strange ones too, and it would be well for our City Council to take care that their hands are clean, and that no suspicion should attach to them in connection with the coming contract for street lighting. For the \$5,000 which the city pays for street lighting, a service of a very different nature from that now in force should be forthcoming, and it remains with the citizens to see to it that no jobbery takes place in connection with the new contract. No city in Canada of 12,000 inhabitants has such an obsolete street plant as we put up with and why is it? The

lamps are out of date and do not emit sixty per cent of their proper candle power, and still it seems as if the Council by their self-imposed silence are shutting off other possible competitors from competing and will perchance at the eleventh hour and when too late call for tenders and thus place it beyond the power of any one but the Royal Electric Co. of Montreal to put in a tender. For a new concern, who might be a successful tenderer to secure an up-to-date new plant, and place it in position will require many months and tenders should be then have been asked for. The city for what it now spends could have an enclosed Arc lamp that will give out twice the power, given out by the lamp now in use and a lamp that would seldom or never go out. This is too important a matter for our citizens to sit down quietly under, and it is some thing our Council should see to.

SALVATION ARMY WON.

Members Arrested for Holding Services in Victoria Square, Montreal, Released.

MONTREAL, June 7.—James Moore, laborer, and John Kneeland, printer, who were arraigned before the Recorder's court on the charge of singing, shouting and screaming on Victoria Square, Sunday evening last, were declared not guilty by Mr. Recorder Weir.

It was as part of the Salvation Army that these men had gone to Victoria Square and intended to hold a meeting. The police ordered them to move along, but as the constable who spoke to them did not show his police badge, the men refused to go, and were finally arrested.

Mr. Recorder Weir said that the case was rather difficult, and gave rise to a much discussed question. "British subjects," he said, "have a unique privilege; they meet together for services and meetings in public squares. Public meetings are a prominent feature wherever they are found, and had this been a political meeting I doubt very much that there would have been any arrests at all. The Salvation Army is a well recognized institution, and it is admitted that it does great good. Its methods are peculiar and distinct, but as long as it does not interfere with the rights of the public it has the right to exercise its profession. This was a religious meeting held on Sunday, and religious meetings are for the benefit of the public therefore, I dismiss the action."
