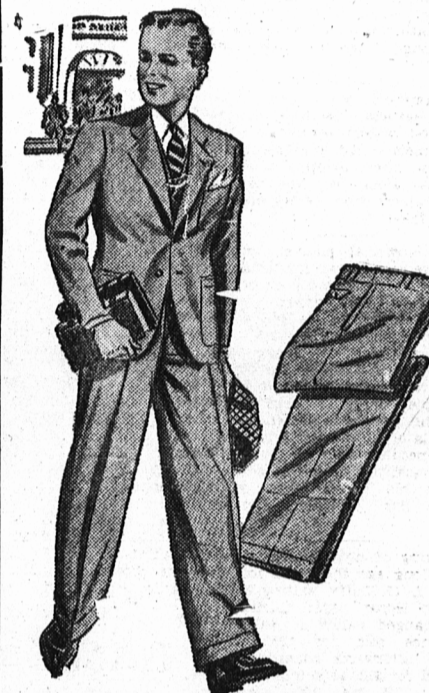

Wolverine Athletic Club Re-organizes

HALIFAX, April 3. — Prospects that this city would be represented in the hockey world by the coveted Allan Cup in the 1936-37 season by Halifax Wolverines appeared bright today following organization of the Wolverines Social and Athletic Club. Jack Conn, manager-owner of the powerful Wolves team that won the Dominion championships in 1935, was elected Honorary President of the newly-formed club. Harry Butler was named President. Entry will be made in the city softball league by the Wolverines and other activities will be pursued by members of the organization during the summer. By the time baseball and rugby play-offs have begun to fade and the hockey drums herald the start of another season of Canada's national sport, it was confidently expected a strong band will have been assembled to attempt to duplicate the feat of their famous predecessors.

Reds Lease Players To Toronto Leafs

HAINES CITY, Fla., April 3.—Thanks to a helping hand from Cincinnati Reds, manager Ike Boone of Toronto Maple Leafs faces the opening of the International League season with more confidence than he has for two years.

The release yesterday of seven players to Toronto by the Reds has given Boone a well-balanced array that may enable the Leafs to battle their way into the thick of the pennant race. Harlin Pool, Tom Oliver and Boone himself will man the outfield posts with Lincoln Blakely, sent down from the Reds, as the principal reserves.

The infield still is a trifle uncertain but Boone's worries over two positions were ended when the Reds handed him first baseman Leslie Scarcella and shortstop Eddie Miller who will succeed Calvin Chapman, the Leafs' 1935 star who now is with the Reds.

Second and third base still are major problems for Boone and he probably will have to start the campaign with inexperienced men at those two positions. Hank Erickson has been sent down from Cincinnati to handle the bulk of the catching with either Jack Crouch or Tommy Heath lending a hand.

The pitching staff looks good now that LeRoy Herrmann, Earl Cook and Francis Wistert have come down from the major league outfit. These, with Jimmy Pattison and Stan Lucas, veterans of two seasons with Toronto, and three newcomers, Lloyd Stirling, former Winnipeg Maroon from Saint John, N. B., Walter Purcey and George Murray, give Boone an effective brigade of sharpshooters.

Adams Voices Criticism Of Officiating

BOSTON, April 3. — President Charles Adams of Boston Bruins charged today in a letter to President Frank Calder of the National Hockey League that "apparent irregularity, if not gross inefficiency of the officiating" marked the Stanley Cup playoff game between the Bruins and Leafs at Toronto last week.

The game, second and decisive tilt of the opening series for the Cup, was won by the Leafs, 8-3. It knocked the Bruins out of the cup hunt after they had apparently ensured their continuance by blanking the Leafs 3-0 at Boston two nights earlier.

Although Adams witnessed neither of the games, he declared the comments of United States and Canadian sports writers indicated Prexy Calder should "at least make a statement concerning the conditions" under which the final duel was fought.

He demanded the League heads take "remedial action" but added: "It is obvious the Boston club can expect no league action which could offer commensurate redress."

"The Bruin President," asked what "justification" there was for permitting Odie Cleghorn to officiate "in view of repeated complications and disturbances" in the past.

He also asked Calder for the first and third Toronto goals were legal. Newspaper pictures, Adams said, showed Red Horner, Toronto defenceman, in the crease, when the third Toronto goal was scored.

The Boston club owner also wanted to know if Calder believed play in the first period unnecessarily rough and "at times illegal."

We have far better natural facilities here than in almost any other part of the Dominion."

Eastern Allan Cup Final Game Tonight

TORONTO, April 3.—Jess Spring and Sammy Rothschild, coaches of Eastern Canada's senior hockey finalists, paced their charges through light workouts today and ordered them to bed early in preparation for the sudden-death game here tomorrow afternoon for the East's Allan Cup final berth.

Rothschild, more than satisfied with his Sudbury Falcons' showing in the second game which they won 5-0, had nothing but confidence the Falcons would eliminate Brockville Magedomas and meet Kimberley Dynamiters for the Cup.

Magedomas, who won the first game of the best-of-three series in Ottawa by 5-4, may have some lineup changes but Spring wouldn't disclose his plans. He was far from pleased with the showing of his boys in the 5-0 defeat.

Lawn Bowlers To Make Tour

LONDON, Ont., April 3.—The tour of Wales, Ireland and Scotland by Canadian Lawn Bowlers this year will go through as scheduled, A. A. Langford, organizer for the Canadian team, announced here today. A cable of last week, announcing cancellation of the tour, applied only to England, where because of lack of time and the many clubs in that country, it was deemed impossible to arrange official matches. Friendly games will be welcomed by the English Association, however.

Plans of the Canadian Council are to send a team of at least five skiffs sailing from Quebec May 30 for Southampton.
