MINERS ARE NOW ENTOMBED HOPELESSLY

Thirty Victims of Deadly Gas Explosion in a Pennsylvania Mine Which Occurred Sunday Night, All Believed To Be Asphyxiated

FAYETTE CITY, Pa. Dec. 2.—(Special)

Between 25 and 30 miners, possibly more, are entombed in the Noami mine of the United Coal Co. three miles west of this city and there is practically no hope that any of them are alive.

Their imprisonment is due to an explosion of black damp about 8 o'clock last night, soon after the night force went to work.

It is said a miner entering an old working with an open lamp caused the explosion.

Had the disaster occurred on any other night except Sunday the number of victims would have been twice as large.

The mine employs from 275 to 300 regularly, about one fourth of them at night; but on Sunday night about half the regular force go to work.

The shafts and concrete sides were broken down so as to completely close the passage back to consider able distance.

About a hundred feet from the entrance

is located the first air shaft, and from this the deadly gas pours in dense volumes. Gas found in the mines in this territory is so poisonous that no human being can live in it for more than a few minutes, and for this reason it is not believed a single one of the entombed men is still alive.

One man, an unidentified foreigner, managed to climb to the top of the first air shaft, but dropped dead there.

No sign of life has come from the others.

THE REGULAR MEETING OF THE SCHOOL BOARD

Petition From Parents Asking Change Of School Hours Principal Heard

The regular monthly meeting of the City School Board was held last night. The teachers report showed enrollment for the month 1133; retural attendance 1073; average 989; per centage 90; cases of tardiness

211; truants 4; visits 216; notices 58; 14 cases corporal punishment; 35 below average in grading.

A petition was read signed by 41 parents asking that the school hours be changed from 9 am till 1 pm during the winter months.

After discussion petition was laid on the table.

The principals of the city schools were admitted to learn the Board's decision in reference to corporal punishment, detaining children after school hours, and the question of home lessons.

Nothing decisive was arrived at although the matters were well discussed.

The schools will close for the Christmas holidays Dec. 20, and reopen Jan. 6.

IMMIGRANT STEAMER IS A TOTAL WRECK

At Mouth of La Have River, Had 762 Souls Aboard Who Were All Landed Safely By Heroic Effort.

BRIDGEWATER, N.S. Dec. 2.—(Special)

Between eleven and twelve o'clock last night, in a blinding snow-storm, with a southeast gale the J. P. R. Steamer, Mount Temple, bound to St. John from Antwerp, struck on the north head of Longbound, east side of the mouth of La Have River.

The steamer was far out of her course. She had on board 663 immigrant passengers with a crew of 99.

She went broadside on the rocks, the seas breaking clean over her.

When the panic stricken passengers rushed on deck they were waist deep in water.

With tremendous effort communication with the light house was made.

All passengers were supplied with life preservers and first the women and children were transferred to the Island in baskets and later the men by boats.

All were saved but suffered greatly from wet and cold.

The immigrants were bound for Quebec, Ontario, the west, and the Sydney Steel Works.
