At 7:30 this morning the candidates for confirmation will be admitted to their first communion. In the afternoon at three o'clock the sacrament of confirmation will be administered by Bishop Cameron to 145 children, 75 boys and 65 girls.

AMONG those recently licensed by the Presbytery of Cayuga, in the State of New York, we notice the name of Mr. D. A. McLeod of P. E. I., son of Colin McLeod, Esq., of Bonshaw. Mr. McLeod was for some time, a student of the P. W. College, and is well and favorably known in Charlottetown. He has taken his B. A. degree from one of the American Universities, and pursued his Theological Course at Auburn Seminary, New York. He is now in charge of the Presbyterian congregation of Whitelaw, New York. We learn that his earnestness and eloquence as a preacher and attractive social qualities have already greatly endeared him to his people. We heartily congratulate Mr. McLeod on his success, and wish him a most useful career in the Christian Ministry.

THE adjourned meeting of the School Board was held last evening. The teachers' returns showed the enrolment for the past month to be 1332, actual attendance 1226, average attendance 1003, percentage 85, cases of tardiness 203, truants 12, visits by teachers 212, notices 66, corporal punishment 8, below average in grading 73, requests to leave school before the hour of closing 179. Miss Mackinnon and Mr. Bowness had no cases of tardiness. The highest percentage of attendance in Prince St. School was made in Miss Hooper's room 90; in Queen Square School, Mr. R. E. Smith's 90; in West Kent School Miss Wadman's 93. It was agreed that the Schools close for midsummer holidays on Thursday June 27th, and re-open on Tuesday 3rd of September. The closing exercises will be conducted as in preceding years. The order of closing will be as follows:—Prince Street School 9 to 10 a. m.; West Kent 10.30 to 11.30. Queen Square 12 to 1. It was agreed that the proposed alteration of class rooms be deferred. It was ordered that debentures be issued to the amount of \$800.00 for new boiler, and repairs to janitor's cottage, total cost of both being \$369.00. The Secretary was directed to call for tenders for the supply of coal and for white-washing Queen Square School. After passing some bills the meeting adjourned.

Rev. J. Idrisyn Jones had a large and representative audience in the First Methodist Church schoolroom to hear his lecture on Anglo-Israel last evening, and those present were quite hearty in their appreciation as evinced by frequent applause. The meeting was opened by singing and a prayer by Rev. G. P. Raymond. The lecture occupied about an hour and a half, and presented in a clear and forceful manner the arguments to show that the British people are the lost tribes of Israel. He argued from Scripture largely, showing that to Israel was promised that she should be the greatest of nations, a mother of nations, unconquerable, mistress of the seas, a Sabbath-keeping nation, a lender but not a borrower, that she should possess the gateways of the world and that these were attributes of the British nation and of no other now existing.
