THE MINTO.—The Minto did not
save Summerside Thursday. Friday
morning she leaves Summerside for
Cape Tormentine on her last on that
route. After reaching Cape Tormentine
she immediately proceeds to
Charlottetown to take up the Char-
lottetown and Pictou route.

CITY FIRE DEPARTMENT.—In re-
porting to the City Council for the
year 1913, the chairman of the Fire
Department of Charlottetown, Mr.
John McKenna, said that there had
been twenty-four fire alarms in the
city during that year, a good many
of them false alarms, but there were
several serious fires. The men had
been willing at all times to respond
to the call of duty. The department,
he said, was in good condition. Five
hundred feet of new hose had been
added recently, and the department
was now supplied with something
like 3,000 feet of good hose, avail-
able at any time. The fire engine, the
old Siskian, had recently been taken
to Bruce Stewart's and thoroughly
renovated and was now in condition
for good service.

THE MAILS.—The train, with the
two days mail brought to Summerside
by the Minto, arrived in Charlottetown
Thursday at 12.30 o'clock. The mails
were ordered to Pictou
Wednesday and the mail of that day
was brought to Charlottetown by the
Earl Grey Thursday along with the
Thursday's mail. The mail will be
sent from Charlottetown by the
Earl Grey Friday morning. The
Minto, which leaves Summerside for
Tormentine, on Friday morning will
take the foreign mails from Tormentine
to Charlottetown direct. At
Friday all mail will go via the
Charlottetown Pictou route.

FRIDAY NIGHT'S GAME.—Friday
night in the Arena Rink the second
game of the P. E. Island Hockey
League takes place between the Con-
naughts and Victorias. The ability
of the Victoria team is too well
known for comment, having won not
only the championship of the P. E.
Island Hockey League but also fur-
ther distinguished themselves by win-
ning the Starr Trophy, for the cham-
pionship of Maritime Canada,
which they now hold permanently.
Their team will be somewhat chang-
ed this year as a number of the
former members will not play. Dou-
gan, the star centre of last year's
septette is not on the island and
consequently will be unable to line
up. "Jack" Ingraham, the right
wing of last year's team is another
absent member and is playing with
the Halifax Socials. Burns or Mc-
Askill, two other stars of last year,
will also be out of the game. The
new senior Victoria goal keeper
played in the intermediate nets last
season and a worthy substitute for
McAskill. Prowse, who replaces
Burns at Cover Point, is an old play-
er of the first "Champion Victoria
team" and is well known in hockey
circles. He specializes in long shoots
which he can deal out abundantly
and dangerously at long range. The
Connaughts also have a strong ag-
gretativa and will be strengthened in
the coming game by J. McDonald,
who is sick for the last game.
The following will be the line ups:
Victorias—Goal, Moran; Point, D.
Cheverie; Cover Point, Wm. Frowse;
Rover, Percy Rodd; Centre, J. Gal-
laghan; Left Wing, C. Milford; Right
Wing, J. Prowse. Connaughts—Goal,
McAleer; Point, Hudson; Cover Point,
Purcell; Forwards, McAree, Moore,
Murnaghan, L. McDonald. The Con-
naughts have not definitely decided
their line-up but the above is the
likely team.

POULTRY SHOW.—The Sixth An-
nual Show held recently under the
auspices of the P. E. I. F. A. was
by far the best poultry show ever
held in Prince Edward Island. The
quality in all departments was ex-
cellent, the winning birds all scoring
high. A new feature this season was
the introduction of a large utility
class in which farmers only were al-
lowed to compete and the birds en-
tered in this class were of strong evi-
dence of the rapid strides being made
by Prince Edward Island farmers in
poultry culture. It was noticeable
that members of the Prince Edward
Island egg circles carried off a large
proportion of the prizes. It should
be mentioned in fairness that some
who are scientific breeders and who
would have claimed to compete in
this utility class, refrained from so
doing to give the farmers generally
a fair chance. Among these may be
mentioned Mr. L. H. D. Foster, of
Marshfield; Geo. Lightizer, West
Royalty; Mr. L. H. D. Foster's bird-
ered plymough rocks which were on
exhibition are excellent birds, as also
are Mr. Geo. Lightizer's white
wyandottes, showing as they do per-
fect health and vigor. The egg ex-
hibition put up by the poultry Divi-
sion of the Department of Agriculture,
was really a wonderful clear and
graphic illustration of the old wrong
way, and the new improved systems
of marketing eggs. Every feature of
the two systems was clearly compar-
ed by means of models set on land-
scape paintings, the great advan-
tages of the egg circle system to both
producer and consumer being made
manifest. It is understood that Mr.
J. H. Hare of the Department at Ot-
tawa is responsible for this exhibit
so far as the details are concerned
and Mr. W. A. Brown, who is in di-
rect control of the poultry division is
to be congratulated, as is the depart-
ment, upon the unqualified success of
this exhibit both at Amherst and
Charlottetown.

MORAL REFORM.—At a meeting
of the Provincial and Moral Reform
League held in the Y.M.C.A. building
Monday a resolution was passed ex-
pressing appreciation of the work
done by the Temperance Alliance in
endeavoring to prevent the illegal
sale of intoxicating liquors in this
province.

NOT SO SERIOUS.—The injury
Mr. F. Burhoe, of the Connaughts
Hockey team, in Tuesday night's
game is not so serious as was at
first thought. Mr. Burhoe was cut a-
bove the eye in three places, above
and below on the side. The wounds
have been medically attended to and
are healing up well. The player will
be kept out of the match Friday
night on this account but will be
able to resume his position with the
team in the succeeding game.

MAN MISSING.—The Pictou Advo-
cate of the 12th informs its readers
that Mr. Colin McKenzie of the land-
ing is missing. On Wednesday of the
previous week Mr. McKenzie attend-
ed a hockey match in New Glasgow,
and came down to Pictou on the
late train. As near as can be ascer-
tained he was last seen some time
after the arrival of the train when
he announced to some of the fellows
with him that he was going to start
home across the ice. It is feared
that the ice, which is none too safe,
broke and that McKenzie went
through and was drowned. The miss-
ing man is well known in the place
and the news of the tragedy will be
a shock to his friends here, while
their sympathy will go to the beset-
ted wife, six children and an aged
mother.
