Black Hawks Lost First Home Game To Rangers 2-1

CHICAGO, Nov. 26—(AP)—Chicago Black Hawks tonight were defeated for the first time in five National Hockey League games as the last-place New York Rangers, greatly fortified by a rookie goalie playing his first game under the big top, made two first-period goals slick for a 2-1 victory before a crowd of 11,354.

Chicago's defeat enabled Detroit Red Wings, 2-1 victors over Toronto Maple Leafs at Detroit, to move into undisputed possession of first place in the N.H.L.

The Hawks, dropping their first game of the season on home ice, failed to click through the wild contest until 16:01 of the final period when they were to play high scoring centre who was bottled up most of the night, drilled a wazi-high shot to the left of netminder Jimmy Frank to crisp passes from brother Doug and George Allen.

Tulsa Ends Schedule Still Undefeated

NEW YORK, Nov. 26—(AP)—Tulsa found Arkansas easy to handle today and stormed through the Southwest Conference team 40-7 to complete a 10-game football schedule without a tie or a defeat.

On the same Thanksgiving Day college football program, Texas defeated Texas A & M in a tough proposition but scored in the final 46 seconds for a 12-6 triumph that brought the winners the southwest conference flag and a bid to the New Year's Day Cotton Bowl game.

Missouri clinched its second straight big six crown by defeating Kansas 42-13 and William & Mary's team postponed its dinner engagement until Richmond was beaten, 10-0, and the Southern Conference title added its collection.

Some of the day's best football however, was reserved for games which had no title aspect. Pennsylvania snapped out of a mid-season slump to crush Cornell 34-7; Louisiana State University got two touchdowns in the final period to tempt Tulane 18-6; and the Great Lakes team, unscathed upon since mid-October, crushed Northwestern 48-0.

Tulsa, already the owner of the Missouri Valley Conference Title, insured itself of bowl consideration in the defeat of Arkansas.

Kelly Finally Clicks In Berwick Race

BERWICK, Pa., Nov. 26—(AP)—After falling in eight previous attempts, Pile Kid Kelly won the annual Thanksgiving Berwick Marathon run today.

Kelly, inducted into the army only two weeks ago, covered the nine miles, 300-yard course in 48 minutes, 55 seconds.

Wilmer Sharradin, Hamilton, Ont., other Canadian entrant in the race, which in past years was won successively by several top-notch Canadian distance runners, placed sixth in 50:12.

Norman Gordon, Penn State cross-country captain representing the Shannahan C.C. of Philadelphia, finished second with Cur's Stone, also of Penn State, third and William Steiner of New York, fourth.

Lois Gregory, Cleveland, N. Y., school master, who won a year ago was forced out early in the grind because of an injury to his side. Kelly was more than a minute and a half under the course record of 47 minutes, 16 seconds, set by Scotty Rankine, of Preston, Ont., several years ago.

Red Wings Outplay Leafs For 2-1 Win

DETROIT, Nov. 26—(CP)—Detroit Red Wings came from behind with two third-period goals to defeat Toronto Maple Leafs 2-1, before 13,912 spectators, largest crowd ever to see a National Hockey League game here. Little Connie Brown fired home the winning goal with less than five minutes of play.

The Leafs, who had polished off Detroit in the last four games of the Stanley Cup Playoffs and had whipped the Wings once this season, were outtraced practically all the way.

Defenceman Jimmy Orlando of Detroit went out of the game in the second period when he suffered a five-stitch skate wound in a collision with Syl Apps.

Dick Irvin, veteran hockey player and former coach of Chicago Black Hawks, signed 11 years ago today to coach Toronto Maple Leafs of the National Hockey League. Irvin remained with Toronto until 1940 when he went to Montreal Canadiens as coach.

Gordon Richards, 38-year-old jockey who rides the King's horses among other, signed up as champion jockey for the 15th time in the 23 years he has held a licence. He was up on 67 winners and now is but six short of Fred Archer's accepted all-time record of 2,749. That's a mark that has stood since 1888.

Archer, who died a suicide after a life of semi-starvation in an attempt to keep his weight down, rode for 17 seasons and was champion 13 times. His victories included five derby triumphs. Richards has won every classic except the derby.

The King's trainer, Fred Darling, headed the trainers' winning with 30 successes netting an aggregate of \$1,000.

LONDON, Nov. 26—(CP)—Britain's 1942 racing season is over. Because of the war it could have been better than a number of points of view. But there is this—it could be rightly called the season of royal successes.

There will be flat racing again next year, somewhat along the same severely staid lines as this, but there seems little likelihood of a repeated succession of triumphs for the King.

During this season, His Majesty headed the list of winning owners for the first time. Takings of the Royal stable, approximately \$400,000, have been roughly \$250,000 in pacetime. Prize money has been much reduced.
