MR. DONALD NICHOLSON

After a short but painful illness borne with great patience and resignation there passed away on Feb. 5, 1929, at the residence of his daughter, Mrs. John MacLeod, 42 Upper Queen St., Charlottetown, Mr. Donald Nicholson at the age of seventy-five.

Mr. Nicholson was born on December 23rd, 1853, at Sarnia, Ont. and on his father's death which occurred when he was only three or four years old he came to this province under the charge of his mother. At the age of 13 he went to sea as cabin boy with the late Capt. Robert Fraser a famous navigator of those early days. He sailed with Captain Fraser in that capacity for three years. Then he was apprenticed to the carpenter trade and having served his term of apprenticeship he

again took to sea and for a number of years he was in the European and South American trade sailing in Island and Nova Scotia ships. After quitting the sea he worked at the carpenter trade in the Western States, afterwards coming back to Massachusetts where he remained for a number of years. Returning to the island he settled down to farming and save for occasional intervals in Colorado and the Eastern States this was his occupation for the greater part of his latter days. He has farmed in Surrey, Little Sands and Stanchel. He died in the full assurance of the merits of his Redeemer. He leaves to mourn the loss of a loving father, Mrs. John MacLeod, already mentioned, a son John in B. Columbia and two daughters, Catherine, in Halifax, N. S. and Christina in Massachusetts, and a sister, Mrs. E. Fullerton of Portland Me., also two half-brothers, D. J. MacDonald of St. Louis, Missouri, and C. S. MacDonald of Wood Island and a half-sister, Mrs. Malcolm Mac-borne of Springvale Me. His first wife predeceased him some three or four years ago. He is survived by his widow, relict of the late Lauchlin Ross of Surrey.
