**Stock Markets At A Glance**

**WINNIPEG, March 9 — (CP) —** Rye futures displayed irregularly in active trading today on the Winnipeg Exchange and closing values were 3-2 1/2, cents a bushel lower.

**CHICAGO, March 9 — (AP) —** Belief that grains may have been oversold in yesterday's closing break generally enough today to rally futures markets but rally liquidation, especially of new crop deliveries, reappeared and most of the early gains were lost.

At the finish wheat was 3/4 to 1-1/4 higher, May 1 1/4. Corn was off 1/4 to 3/8.

**MONTREAL, March 9 — (CP) —** Levels of security prices were again depressed in trading on the Stock Exchange and Cur Market today as the selling wave which broke out late Thursday was continued. Declines up to 2 1/2 points were registered though adjustments downward were fractional in most cases.

Market analysts stated that, while possibility of an early peace may have revived anxiety among stockholders of reconversion problems and started the liquidation, some revision was to have been expected in view of the general advance in prices since the new year.

**TORONTO, March 9 — (CP) —** Wide losses were posted on the Toronto Stock Exchange in today's session, as prices slipped off under the influence of a heavy New York tone. It was supposed in the financial district that the prospect of early termination of hostilities in Europe and the unsettled market was likely to hamper business in the change over to peace-time production was the depressing factor in the market.

The gold shares declined 2.57 in the index; losses of 1.34 were reported by the industrial and West-ern Oils were down 37 at the close. Volume was the heaviest in a year or more at 1,990,000 shares.

**NEW YORK, March 9 — (AP) —** The Stock Market continued on the downward course today but, while declines ranged from 1 to 2 1/2 points, the selling seemed to lack the urgency that accompanied the sharp Thursday release.

The Associated 60-stock average was off 1.1 points at 80.3, on top of yesterday's slump of 1.2 which was the widest break in 12 months. The retreat was broad, 1013 issues registering. Of these, 377 were down against 107 up or unchanged. Total volume of 2,680,000 shares compared with 1,860,000 the day before. The final hour accounted for only 360,000.

Canadian issues also were down. McIntyre lost one point, Hiram Walker 3 and Dome 2 1/4. U.S. Canadian Pacific was down 3/4 and Distillers Seagrams 1/4.
