OWING to the unfavorable weather the S. S. City of London did not return from Crapaud Saturday evening but arrived here yesterday at 7 a. m.

THE cargo by the City of London Saturday morning from Victoria included a car machinery; 20 cases eggs, 35 cases lobsters, half car iron, 15 bags potatoes and four live hogs.

FURTHER particulars received regarding the death of William D. Ross at Vancouver say he was found drowned under a boom of logs at the Royal City mills. The death is supposed to have been accidental. Ross is thought to have walked off the boom of logs in the dark.
