Golf Season Late But Fits Advanced Dates

CHICAGO, May 28. —Crowning of the various major American golf champions will come later than usual this year, owing to the plan to allow participation by the stars of the United States in the British meets.

This scheme which was deemed justified on account of the large number of leading linksmen who desired to enter the Transatlantic contests, pushed the National open championship over into July.

Nature seemed to approve of the arrangement for a remarkable year, as about a month late, with grass just recently beginning to grow in the northern states. In addition to the delay, a provision was made for the automatic qualification of the thirty leaders in last year's national open, so that invaders of the field will not have to hasten back for the elimination rounds in seventeen cities on June 14th.

The curtain raisers in the United States, in addition to the southern tourneys, are the qualifying rounds for the remarkable middle of June and the Transatlantic championship at the Algonquin club, St. Louis, June 21st, 26th. This midwest title will be defended by Clarence Wolf of St. Louis, who won in a thrilling match at Wyandott club last year from Arthur Bartlett of Ottumwa, both taking several strokes off par.

The east has most of the national meets, but the open will be played at the Links of the Seoto club at Columbus, July 8-10. The tournament will be held under the plan used in the Western open for a long time. All the field plays eighteen holes for two days, and then the sixty-four survivors play thirty-six holes on the final day. Macfarlane, who won last year at Wyandott in a remarkable overtime playoff, has had trouble with his eyes since then and may have difficulty in retaining the honor.

The Western Amateur championship, has set its venue at the scenic course of the White Bear Yacht club, St. Paul, July 19-24. Keefe Carter of Oklahoma City who won the title last year at Detroit, plans to defend his crown.

The Public Links event comes next at Buffalo municipal course the week of Aug. 3, and the rapid increase in the number of city courses throughout the country promises a record entry list.

The only conflict in dates is that between the Western open and the Women's Western. The women, whose queen now is Mrs. Elaine Rosenthal of Dallas, are to decide whether to change their dates of Aug. 23-25, while the Western open, which has virtually the same contenders as the National open, takes place at Highlands club, Indianapolis the latter half of the same week.

The conference to decide whether Bobby Jones shall remain national amateur champion for longer than two years in a row is called to convene at the National Country Club, near New York City, Sept. 13-18.

The last big event is the tableau staged by the fair sex, who are to invade Philadelphia on Sept. '26, and struggle until Oct. 2 in an attack upon the prizes of the Glenna Collett of Providence last year at the St. Louis Country club. There she averaged scores of seventy-five all week and defeated Mrs. Alexa Stirling Fraser of Canada in the finals.

Since that time she has accomplished a score of 397 out of 400 and has made 395 and 396 on several occasions. Madame Catherineau and her husband run a house painting business. She was persuaded to try her hand with a rifle in 1923 and the next year scored her Olympic success. She uses a twenty-two inch rifle which weighs thirteen and a half pounds.
