MR. JOHN CROSBIE, of Crosbie & Co. of St. John's, Nfld., who has been on the Island during the past week left Summerside yesterday morning on return home via Charlottetown.

The first mail to be carried by the Northumberland this spring was forwarded from Summerside by the Post Master yesterday morning. The regular summer mail service will go into effect to-day.

The Northumberland arrived from Point du Chene yesterday about 7 o'clock and after unloading and reloading with a general cargo she left again shortly after the arrival of the express train from Charlottetown.

THERE is not much change in the market prices this week and very little produce is offering. Pressed hay has got to some \$10.50 to \$11, while \$10 is being paid for loose hay. Black oats are being bought for 30 cts a bushel.

THE death of Mrs. Mary Boyver, Summerside, relict of the late James R. Boyver occurred about noon yesterday. Deceased was 84 years of age and resided with her daughter Miss Annie Boyver. The funeral will take place to-morrow at 2 p. m.

MOST people are interested in the dates of opening and closing of navigation. This season 1900-1901 there are many dates and the following table may be convenient for reference. The Northumberland made her last trip to Pt du Chene on Dec. 10, remained there until the following day and attempted to reach Summerside, but ice prevented her, and she proceeded to Charlottetown for the winter.

The Stanley forced an entrance to Summerside harbor on Sunday Dec. 22 to test the practicability of Summerside Cape Tormentine route. She made the first trip to Cape Tormentine on Xmas day with a large number of passengers and returned in two hours. Almost daily trips were made until the steamer was withdrawn, because of smallpox scare and lack of terminal facilities at the Cape, on January 3rd.

The Stanley opened Summerside harbor on Good Friday, April 5th, and left again on Monday, April 8th.

The Northumberland owing to ice at Pt. du Chene did not come to Summerside until Sunday April 21st and after two unsuccessful attempts made her first trip to Pt. du Chene on Sunday April 23rd. The mails were transferred on May 1st.
