THE MEDICAL COUNCIL AND THE NEWSPAPERS.

We print in another column the Minute of the Medical Council of P. E. Island in regard to the publication in the newspapers of accounts of cures and brilliant surgical operations, wrought or performed by members of the medical fraternity. We have the highest regard for the Medical Council, the Medical Society and the profession generally within their proper sphere, and we make no objection for the time being to the rules and regulations which the Council or the Medical Society may prescribe for the physicians and surgeons within the Province so far as they do not conflict with the rights and privileges of the general public. But we do object to the Medical Council undertaking to control the press in regard to what shall or shall not appear in the columns of the newspapers.

The newspapers of the country are under control of a body of men who have been trained to their calling, may be assumed to have some aptitude for its duties, and are devoting themselves to their arduous work with some measure of skill and good judgment. It is fair to assume that they know the duties of the newspaper profession better than the doctors do; just as the doctors are much better instructed in what pertains to medicine and surgery than newspaper men are.

It is not within the province of an editor or reporter as such, to prescribe pills or powders for a patient, or to advise whether or not a limb shall be cut off or the interior of the body explored and its deranged organism set right by an operation. They have too much good judgment, and are far too modest to thus trench upon a field already occupied by men of special training and superior skill. Equally it is not within the province of the Medical Council as such to dictate to, or even advise those who conduct newspapers as to what they shall print and what they shall consign to the waste-basket.

So much premised we may venture to hint that the members of the Council in their Minute for the instruction of the press seem to have been guided by very erratic and incomprehensible rules of logic and ethics which we find it difficult to reconcile with their admitted learning and ability. First we are told that the practice of publishing certain matters in the press, (whether with or without the connivance of the medical man) "has become very common." Next we are told that it "is very disgraceful in itself"—which is a broad charge that the newspapers have heretofore commonly disgraced themselves. Then we are told that the Council will not consider the physician blameless unless he can clearly demonstrate his non-complicity, this position being based upon the unsound and un-British principle that an accused or suspected person shall be held guilty until he has proved his innocence.

Finally, and most illogical of all, the newspapers which have in the

past so frequently done a thing "disgraceful in itself" (whether with or without the connivance of the medical man) are asked not to do it again "unless such shall be signed by the medical men themselves." In other words, gentlemen of the Press! you are "respectfully" asked by the Medical Council of P. E. Island not to further disgrace yourselves as you have been doing unless you can have at least one doctor to publicly share in your dishonor.

We conclude that until the Medical Council can prepare some Minute less impertinent, less immoral and less illogical the press will probably continue to exercise a judicious and independent control over its own affairs.

The Asylum Commission will hold their first meeting in the institution at Falconwood today, beginning at 11 o'clock. We are glad to notice by the advertisement which appears in another column that all persons having any charge to make or testimony to submit in the public interest are invited to be present, and will be heard. This is so far quite satisfactory. Let the investigation be thorough and painstaking and we trust it may result in placing the institution on a more satisfactory basis than heretofore.

The Examiner foreshadows an early visit of Sir Charles Tupper and Hon. George E. Foster to this province. On inquiry in an influential Conservative quarter THE GUARDIAN learns that the date of their visit is yet uncertain, but will not be till after Sir Charles returns from his tour in Ontario. The visit will be made in expectation of a general election and may be made earlier or later according to the prospect of election being imminent or otherwise. It is expected that Sir Charles will address a mass meeting in this City and that Hon. Mr. Foster will speak in Summerside when they come.
