THE LEAGUE OF THE EMPIRE.

This is an organization whose avowed object is to inspire personal and active interest in the British Empire as a whole and to promote educational and social intercommunication between the different parts. (1) By the teaching of imperial history and conditions in school lectures; (2) By the furtherance of such training as shall make the members of the League good citizens; (3) By supplying to the youth of the Empire a common bond of literary intercourse by means of a magazine, and by written correspondence, member with member or school with school.

The constitution provides for a council and central committee in London, with separate executive committees in each of the three Kingdoms and the larger colonies and local branches in cities and towns. Smaller divisions will be called chapters or affiliated schools connected with the local branches. Membership will be open to all British subjects, and of three classes. Councillors of the League will pay an annual fee of one guinea; ordinary members one shilling and members under sixteen years six pence.

We cannot here go into full details of the highly interesting scheme but we must mention that it includes a plan of reciprocal education between the schools of the Empire, to be arranged through the several departments of education, principals and teachers by means of correspondence between pupils (with consent of parents.) Already considerable progress has been made and a letter from Mrs. Harry Bap' of London to Mrs. C. C. Gardiner of this city tells that they have already over 300 names of Canadians enrolled who are in correspondence with a great many parts of the Empire, and she adds, "So many of the boys and girls in England are asking for correspondence comrades in Prince Edward Island."

We are sure that many of our teachers and pupils as well would enjoy correspondence with "comrades" in other parts of the Empire—Britain, India, Australia, South Africa, the West Indies, Hong Kong, for instance and that such interchange of letters would be found most interesting and instructive as well as calculated to strengthen the bond of our common citizenship in the great British Empire of which we are all so proud. We sometimes complain that the people of Britain know so little about Canada. We on our part know too little about the

Mother Land. But with hundreds of our teachers and pupils in constant correspondence with the teachers and pupils across the Atlantic much of the ignorance and lack of interest between Britain and her greatest Colony would be in process of speedy removal. We heartily commend the plans of the League of the Empire.
