in addition to the above there were ten convictions for disorderly conduct or street fighting, two for trespass, one for cruelty to animal, one for common assault, and two for wilful damage to city property, in the last mentioned cases two boys damaged the main entrance doors to the market building; they were brought before the Juvenile Court, warned by the Magistrate and released on probation. There were two convictions under the Motor Vehicle Act for speeding.

There was one conviction under the City By-Law respecting Milk and Milk Vendors, One licensed vendor whose sample of milk collected on December 13th, 1928 and found by the City Analyst to contain less than 3-1-2 per cent of butter fat being fined five dollars and costs.

During January we assisted the Prohibition Officers in thirty-five searches of premises suspected of the unlawful possession or sale of intoxicating liquor. Seven prosecutions were entered under the Prohibition Act, resulting in six convictions and one dismissal. One of the convicted offenders paid a fine of \$400 and costs, another paid a fine of \$200 and costs. One offender, being his second offence, was sentenced to six months imprisonment in the County Jail without the option of a fine.
