In Memoriam

MRS. JOHN SHEA

At Cardigan on Friday morning October 7th instant Mrs. John Shea passed to her eternal reward after only a very brief illness. Born in the district now known as St. Charles eighty-six years ago, the deceased (nee Agnes McDonald) was a member of the large family of the late Donald Dougald McDonald, who moved to that part of the country when a young man to carve out a home from the "forest primeval."

Starting out when quite young to make her own way in the world, she spent some time with friends at Cardigan, where, in common with many river-side communities of that day, shipbuilding was a general and prosperous industry. Soon afterward she and a sister departed for the United States, and for several years found steady and lucrative employment there.

Returning home, each to become the bride of a schoolmate friend, the tangible evidence of the practical thrift and industry of those two sisters remains with the writer as one of his earliest and most vivid recollections. In the accumulation of no less than twenty years that on the evening of their arrival by train filled to overflowing the little building that then did duty as a flag-station at Selkirk—a well-filled hope-chest not only for each but duplicated by one for each and every year they had been away.

With equal industry her sturdy young fiancée, the late John Shea, meanwhile had as his part in preparation. On the summit of the very hill the highest, that evidently had suggested to the original French settlers—soon afterward dispersed their name for the hill district, Gros-haut, he chose the site of their future home. There they settled and through many happy years prospered and reared their family of three daughters, Helen (now Mrs. Joseph Warner, Rumford, Maine); Hannah (wife of Mr. A. A. MacPhee, C. N. R.); and Laura Belle, who, as the wife of Mr. Joseph Shea, of Rumford, Maine, died at that place three years ago.

In this home the inborn kindness and gentleness of disposition so marked a trait of that pioneer generation found full expression, both in the family circle and as a whole. With cheerful hospitality to both friend and stranger, the genuineness of their welcome made every call a pleasure, and remained a matter of affectionate recollection throughout their simple years. Cheered by their simple joys in recreations near at hand, the usual diversity of occupation on the farm with the special interest on her part, as an enthusiastic flower-lover, in an always gorgeous garden as an additional source of pleasure, their lives were cast in pleasant places, and in all things, even in the tribulations sure to come to all.

Their lives glided on like rivers that water the woodlands, darkened by shadows of Earth, but reflecting an image of Heaven.

Shortly after the death of her husband fifteen years ago, and the return to Maine of other members of the family, she came to Selkirk, to make her home with the remaining daughter, wife of Mr. A. A. MacPhee. In the regular course of advancement by seniority in the C. N. R., she has been stationed for the past few years at Cardigan, to which place he brought his family temporarily, and so it was that, by an interesting coincidence, her long and useful career reached its earthly termination in the place where so many years before she had ventured first on the journey destined to see such length of days.

Never seriously ill in all her life, a cold contracted very simply in some of the household activities in which, with insatiable industry, she was always bound to share, was the immediate cause of her final illness. Prompt medical attention and careful nursing alleviated considerably the distress arising from pleurisy and a weakened heart condition; devout reception of the Last Sacraments at the hands of Rev. Michael

Rooney, parish priest, consoled and comforted her last hours, and then, conscious almost to the last, and in that abiding faith that had been her constant consolation throughout life, she calmly sank into her eternal rest with God. Although comparatively a stranger in that community, still as the word of her death was circulated throughout the village and surrounding country, a multitude of friends and sympathizers assembled that evening to pay their tribute of respect, and the traditional "Prayers for the Dead" were recited beside her bier by the parish priest.

The following afternoon under direction of Mr. Peter Murphy, the remains were transferred to Selkirk, by motor, accompanied by several cars conveying close relatives and friends. As that modest and mournful cavalcade sped on its silent way across those hills and dales that had been the scene of her happy childhood days, the literal "Garden" wherein her womanly "home" and heart had experienced full fruition, and to which, no doubt, in later years her thoughts had often turned; if it be true, as we may well assume that,

"The spirit world about this world of sense Floats like an atmosphere, and Wafts through those mists and vapors dense A purer breath of more ethereal air,"

then, as the fleeting cortege passed, on the summit of that "High Hill," her erstwhile home, still open, where a youthful group of girls, still in school, in respectful, wide-eyed silence to see grand-aunt "Nan-nan," in her "narrow bed," go by; as down that hill, and on the opposite slope, her childhood home vibrated with century-old memories, but warmed and lighted now only by the beams of the descending sun, smiled a "Hail, and Farewell" from its vacant walls; still up the slope, where the trim white farmhouses, nestling in russet fields and sheltering groves, reflect the level sunlight from every window like glances of sympathy from so many friendly eyes; as beyond the crest of yet another hill, like an uplifted hand to point, "The way, the Truth, the Life," the church-spire and its surmounting cross, and to out in effluent prominence, lined by the clear October sunshine in glowing and sharply etched relief against its background of leaden northeast clouds, it may not be impossible that even to the inert form in its funeral shroud there may have been communicated some thrill from the mystic world beyond the veil, as all this symbolic panorama bespoke the varying scenes in native setting along that attenuated mundane span that now had reached its end.

Arrived at the MacPhee home, at Selkirk, there was still more in evidence the high esteem and genuine regard which had become an established condition throughout the years that the deceased had resided here,—or, to be exact, as next-door neighbor, in the nearby home of her daughter and son-in-law, but now temporarily closed, during his absence by transfer to Cardigan. All Saturday afternoon and evening the large residence was literally crowded, as friends from all directions came for the final call on one who in life had so abundantly merited their respect, and who now in death is remembered in their prayers. Further evidence of this esteem found highly appreciated expression in the floral tributes, artistic bouquets and numerous Mass Cards left in token by sympathizing friends.

Funeral service was conducted, with the assistance of Rev. George McDonald P.P., St. Margaret's, by the parish priest, Rev. P. Callaghan, D. D., who also on the following morning celebrated Requiem Mass for the soul of the deceased. Then in the nearby cemetery her earthly form was laid in its last repose, beside that of her husband, there to await the call of glorious resurrection. May her soul rest in peace! Keep Mirards in the home.

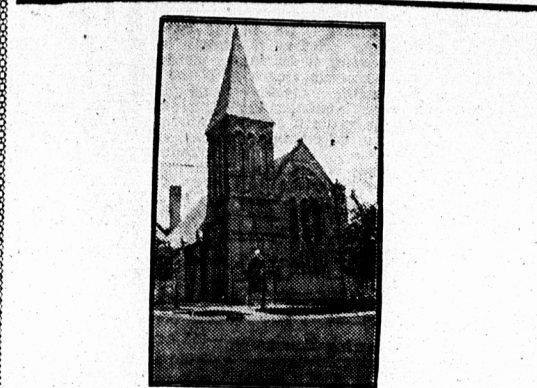
