### Canker in Peaches

Throughout the peach-growing districts of Ontario, canker is recognized as one of the more serious diseases that infest the peach, linking up cultural and pruning practices with "die-back" of twigs and winter injury and with the brown rot problem. As a result of investigations at the Dominion Laboratory of Plant Pathology, St. Catharines, a number of suggestions for prevention of canker are enumerated in the September number of Scientific Agriculture, the official organ of the Canadian Society of Technical Agriculturists.

Cankers on the peach originate from wounds or dead areas, such as—dead twigs, twigs injured by oriental peach moths, stubs, pruning wounds, implement scrapes, damaged crotches, winter injuries, pruning wounds resulting from the removal of previous cankers, injuries following wilt, dead buds, and broken or split branches. Cankers do not appear to be controlled by spraying. Stubs, and pruning wounds made in the dormant season are cankered more frequently than wounds in the early growing season. Proper pruning practices are necessary in orchards of any age and especially so in newly planted ones.

### RECOVER GIRL'S BODY FROM GASPE BAY

### Examination Revealed Girl Had Been Knifed—Dragging Operations Continue.

(Canadian Press) PENINSULA, Que., Oct. 29.—The armless and legless trunk of Maud Asch, 15, was taken from the freezing waters of Gaspé Bay here Saturday and preliminary examination revealed the young woman had been knifed in the abdomen and gagged by a handkerchief.

Together with her cousin, Marguerite Asch, 17, the girl disappeared from her home here on August 30. A country-wide search was begun and about a week ago a girl's foot was found wedged in the rock of the Gaspé Coast. It was tentatively identified as having belonged to her while a coat and shoe found nearby on the beach were identified by relatives as having been her property. The body was taken from the water on Saturday by fishermen and police who continued dragging the

### CREPES DE BOEUF

- 1 cup flour
- 1 egg
- 1 1/2 cups milk
- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1 small finely chopped onion
- 2 tablespoons fat
- 1 cup finely chopped meat
- Salt and pepper
- Melted butter
- Chopped parsley

Prepare a batter of the flour, egg, milk, baking powder and one-fourth teaspoon salt. Beat the ingredients together very thoroughly and then set aside while one small, finely chopped onion is fried to a golden brown in one tablespoon of dripping or butter. Add the finely chopped meat to the browned onion. Season the mixture with salt and pepper and stir over the fire for a few moments before it is added to the batter, and give it a thorough beating. The "crepes" are cooked like large pancakes on a buttered griddle; then spread with melted butter, sprinkle with chopped parsley, roll up snugly and rush to the table piping hot.
