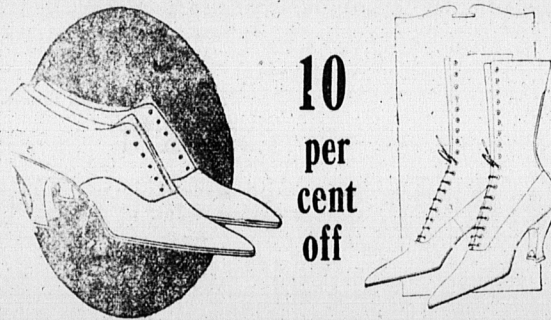

**Lobster Season**  
Sir.—Referring to an item, published in your paper of the 14th headed "The Lobster Season" and signed "Lobster Packer," I must say that this petition is being signed by all the larger packers who have already booked orders, also engaged help for the spring season. Should the season be changed those engaged for present season would be employed at some other work before the autumn season would be at hand. Most of the smaller packers along those shores do not require any hired help and have but little if any preparations to make. Also referring to lobster bait, I do not see any need of a shortage; in fact we can get any amount shipped to our nearest railway station from Murray Harbour or the North Shore of P. E. I. in due time to keep us in supply till the Magdalen vessels arrive. And if we bought our supply on May 14, or earlier for the autumn season there would be a great deal of expense added for curing to keep it fit for lobster bait use for autumn season.

Now as to the ice: In 1916 there was some Northern ice drift up the Strait, doing considerable damage to fishing boats, but it is once in a great while this ever occurs. The autumn season would be still more destructive on gear, when the heavy autumn gales would keep us from overhauling our gear for several days at a time, the traps lie still on the bottom, then those destructive worms, which are not active in the colder water in the spring, gnaw and have the traps totally destroying them. I will also add that we have the only law that will protect the Lobster Industry and the right seasons.

**DELEGATION OF LIGHTHOUSE MEN TO GO TO OTTAWA.**

A St. John exchange says:—The Canadian Brotherhood of Lighthouse Keepers' Association held their first convention in this city at the Victoria Hotel yesterday afternoon. Between forty and fifty lighthouse keepers, from all of the new Brunswick coast, were present at the convention. The New Brunswick branch of the association was organized and the officers elected as follows: President, J. E. Collins, the fog alarm engineer of Cape Spencer lighthouse; vice-president, K. McLennan, the keeper of the Point Esquimaux lighthouse; secretary, Frank Frauley, fog alarm engineer of Point Lepreaux lighthouse.

A delegation was appointed to go to Ottawa for the purpose of laying before the house at the next session matters of interest to the members of the association. R. W. Lindsay, of Quebec, Dominion secretary, was chairman of the convention, and he told a reporter last evening that this was the first convention which had been held by the association since its inception in March, 1919. The next convention will be held in Quebec on February 3, and Mr. Lindsay expected that conventions would also be held through the year in Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island and Ontario. He expressed himself as very well pleased with the work that had been done yesterday and, although he would say nothing about the matter to be placed before parliament, he added that if the lighthouse keepers' request, granted, it would help them greatly with their work. The majority of those who attended the convention will leave for their homes today.
