to defeat the contract was to duck two leads of trumps and only if declarer led a third round of trumps, to take the ace. Now West himself could return the fourth trump, knocking out the last trump in both declarer's and dummy's hand, and this would leave declarer high and dry with only four hearts, three spades, one diamond ruff and three clubs - a total of 11 tricks. It would do South no good against the proper defense to ruff another diamond or even two more diamonds, in dummy, because by holding up the trump ace West could always manage to force declarer with still another diamond lead and in that way assure himself of two trump tricks.
