"The annual meeting of the King's County Temperance Alliance was held at Montague on November 14th. The following officers were appointed: William McLeod, Dundas, President; Rev. H. W. Toombs, Georgetown; Rev. W. D. Wilson, Montague; Rev. A. F. Wightman, Souris; Rev. N. N. McLeod, Dundas; Rev. A. J. McNeill, Murray River; Rev. E. S. Weeks, Mt. Stewart, Vice-Presidents; D. L. McKinnon, Montague, Sec'y. Tres. Mr. Mosher gave a report of his work during the year. Had eight convictions, five paid fines, two were in jail, and one left the Province. Another case pending. The following resolutions were passed: (1) Resolved, That this meeting place on record its entire confidence in its present prosecutor, Mr. Mosher, and its hearty approval of the valuable service he is rendering the cause of Prohibition in King's County. (2) That in the opinion of this meeting, there should be but one prosecutor for King's County, and that this Alliance therefore humbly petition the Government to dismiss the two other prosecutors, and appoint Mr. Mosher at a salary of \$600.00 as sole prosecutor for the county. (3) That this meeting urge upon the Provincial Alliance the necessity of asking the Government at its next session to consider as an amendment to the Provincial Prohibition Act, the amendment to the Nova Scotia Provincial Act, recently passed, (i.e.) "That if a person is seen in public drinking liquor, or in public as having it unlawfully on his person, or if any person is seen or suspected delivering liquor, the liquor can be seized on the spot, as a violation and the party prosecuted," and that the penalty for all forms of violations be increased."

THE PERSIAN QUESTION IN HOUSE OF LORDS.

LONDON, December 8.—In the house of lords yesterday afternoon Lord Curzon raised the Persian question and inquired as to the government's policy. He asked for the papers referring to Russia's first ultimatum, with regard to which Great Britain had advised Persia to comply. He thought that the advice was unpalatable to the Persian government. The second ultimatum there was to the effect that Mr. Shuster had shown evidence of unpalatable lack of acquaintance with the diplomatic usage and language, but Lord Curzon wanted to know if Mr. Shuster's action was really and excuse for an armed outbreak on the part of Russia. The government, he said, could not wash its hands of all responsibility for the second ultimatum. He foresaw that an administrative partition would inevitably proceed to a political partition and then a topographical one. Lord Morley said that the trouble of Persia arose not out of the Anglo-Russian agreement, but from the very nature of the experiment that was being tried in Persia.
