The monthly meeting of the West Prince Ministerial Association was held on Tuesday, Dec. 2, at the United Parsonage, Alberton, with Rev. and Mrs. J.M. Fraser, Rev. G. B. Cunningham presiding, and Rev. W. A. Young conducted the worship, with the theme "Prepare Ye the Way of the Lord," stressing prayer that the ungodly may be converted and that Christians be perfected. The Lord's way is that of Rescue, Salvation and Blessing.

The psalm "I Love the Lord, Because My Voice and Prayers He Did Hear," and the hymn "Thou Didst Leave Thy Throne" were sung. Scripture selection was from Matthew, chapter 7, followed by prayer.

ment that the increases are estimated to involve an additional annual expenditure of \$25,000,000.

It was learned that the increases in pensions accounted for \$7,500,000 of this, jumping the present annual pension liability for the two world wars to \$19,500,000.

SALIENT POINTS

Following are the salient points in the increase announcement: 1. New salary increases have been approved for the clerical grades in the civil service, totaling about 121,000 of which 35,000 are in Ottawa. The clerical grades make up about one third of the entire service. Broadly speaking, the effect of the changes, combined with the increases already made through incorporating into salary rates the war-time cost-of-living bonus, is an increase from 1939 rates of \$30 a month for grade one clerks and about \$40 a month for higher grades, up to and including chief clerk.

2. Pay and subsistence allowance increases for the armed forces and quarters when not provided for - average nearly 10 per cent of the total now being received, varying from about 15 per cent for privates to five per cent for officers. The latest defence headquarters figures show there are about 33,000 service personnel there. These will all be covered by the increases.

Under the pay boosts, a private, who at present makes \$50 a month with a \$4 a month subsistence allowance, will get an increase of \$8 a month to \$58 on pay and \$9 a month to \$67 on subsistence.

3. For totally disabled veterans and pensioned widows, the Government will introduce a bill increasing the pensions by \$10 a month. For partially disabled veterans, there will be proportionate increases in pensions. B

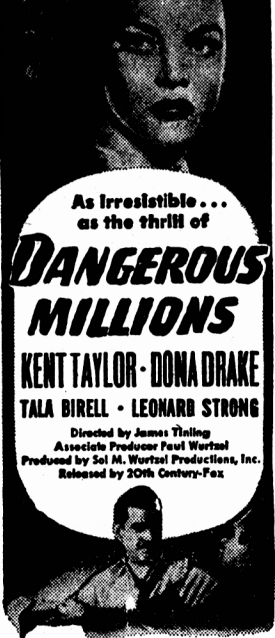

tion of privilege or point of order was involved. tion in 1908, and deputy superintendent-general in 1913. He held that post until his retirement in 1932.

Some of Dr. Scott's poems reflected his deep understanding of Indians and the richness of his sympathy for their welfare. He looked on them as people, not Government charges. Despite his long service with the Government, he was essentially a poet, never permitting routine duties to suppress his dreams of nature and mankind.

Dr. Scott did not begin to write until he was 28 as his first interest was music. It was Archibald Lampman, also a civil servant, who introduced Dr. Scott to composition. His first book, "The Magic House and Other Poems," was published when he was 30.

In 1896 he published a book of short stories of French Canada, entitled "In The Village of Viger." Other works followed. His favorites were "Beauty And Life" published in 1921, and "The Green Cloisters," a collection of later poems.

He wrote a farewell to the King and Queen after their visit to Canada in 1939 and a hymn for the R.C.A.F. during the Second World War.

Dr. Scott was actively engaged in writing almost to the time of his death. His last book, "The Circle of Affection," was published last spring.

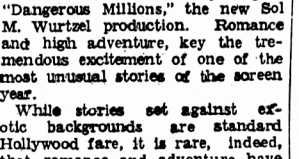
