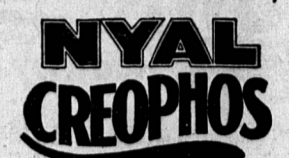

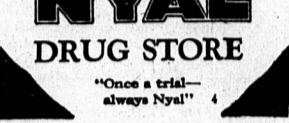

News From Shanghai

(CHINA AND PACIFIC NEWS AGENCY.)

SHANGHAI, Feb. 8.—It is a fact, that the able propaganda of our enemies in China has succeeded in poisoning the minds of the Chinese against us and the present situation is the outcome. The British here know this. It is the keynote and fundamental of the position. Large sums of money and an organized intelligence are being used for the sole purpose of undermining British influence and British trade in China. It would be idle to deny its success. We ourselves have ourselves a means of money to counter these destructive agencies working on an ignorant and credulous people whose minds can be, and are now, sufficiently inflamed.

It is necessary to keep in mind this basic fact in seeking the reason for our present unpopularity. Our enemies lay the blame of it on our shoulders. This is false.

We have seen for many years, the prosperity of British firms and individuals growing with that of the Chinese in this port under conditions exactly fitted for the mutual growth and expansion of trade—namely, a friendly give-and-take confidence in the spoken and written word and bond of each party. Social relations if not exactly intimate, self respecting and cordial. In the last five years, all that, alas, has changed, but it was never started by Chinese business men and it was not sin on our part that brought it about. The reason and the blame for that change cannot be laid at the door of the British trader in China, and we make this statement sincerely and emphatically, leaving the effects of politics and religions aside to those better able to analyse them than we are.

Chinese Business Men

To-day, however, the Chinese business man is frightened. He fears for his prosperity and his money; his possessions acquired under the old and pleasant regime with us are threatened by rapacious outsiders; he is apprehensive of a "Nationalism" which promises much but gives nothing. Also he does not dare express sentiments of friendship for us which might bring odium on him.

We are convinced that no cardinal anxiety really exists between the Chinese traders and ourselves. If he is in a better position to carry on his trade without our help, good luck to him. Change is inevitable. We appreciate his ability and will not grudge him success.

Our real undoing in China, however, lies in a question, not as yet brought about by a jealous, untruthful, unscrupulous enemy and we are faced to-day with the result of his work. This is the real reason the present hostility of the Chinese to the British.

Which is for us, as sure as fate, will be directed against the nationals of other Powers.

The facts are well known to us here, but do not seem to be understood in England, judging from the unfriendly criticisms directed against the British residents in China. Such expressions as "oppression," "exploitation," and the like, are untrue and it is because they are untrue that we are hurt and exasperated on reading them.

British Business Men

British business men living here are not happy just now. We are becoming impoverished through the fault of our own; our personal safety may be threatened; but we repudiate blame. Our business consciences do not afflict us and we send a message to our friends at home and abroad that a few words of sympathy and encouragement would be more helpful to us at this juncture than uninformative and bitter criticism which is used against us.

Russian Child Now Named After Party

MOSCOW, Feb. 8.—An entirely new and revolutionary series of prenomen have been adopted by the Bolsheviks in the christening of their new-born children.

Instead of the old conventional names of Sergius, Peter, Ivan, Oleg, Alexandra, Catherine and Elizabeth, children of Communists nowadays are named after some great revolutionary leader, party, industry or political movement, or even after some town, river or song in Soviet Russia.

For example, many infants of Bolshevik parents are "baptized" Communist, Proletaria, Industria or Stalina, after Joseph Stalin, the big political boss of Soviet Russia.

Others are given names based upon Russian nouns and adjectives possessing a special significance in the present revolutionary movement. "Liberatta" (Liberty), for instance, is a name commonly given to baby girls, and in similar fashion, baby boys are often named "Liber!" (Free).

The Hankow Trouble

(CHINA AND PACIFIC NEWS AGENCY)

SHANGHAI, January 15th.—Strong, tough men, tense with emotion, keyed up to breaking point, grasping their weapons, but holding themselves in check, lost by an overt action, they endanger the lives of the women and children whom they were protecting from a frenzied mob with murder on their hearts and ripe for killing, hurling stones and using every possible means to precipitate a public platform after his Bradford speech, undergo the same unseemable indignities whilst his family were in the same perilous position. At any rate the least that influential Britons in China can do, is to see that the truth be published in London and to present the so-called "Wah" gentleman referring to us as "Greedy Foreigners" and opium smugglers in the future.

One of the many indignities which the volunteers and other Britons had to suffer was the desecration of the British flag in the onslaughts of the British Municipal Council. Yellow streamers, the crazed hooligans stormed the building. A few police and the other British defenders is now history, but the trials of these men, the fortitude with which they withstood the mob's ruses without retaliation, and the filthy indignities and insults, heaped upon them by the crazy Chinese, is something which is yet to be told and which not one single man of them would suffer gain providing the women and children were safe.

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Court Cuts Profit Out Of Pension Fare

COLUMBUS, Ohio, Feb. 8.—The Ohio supreme court has topped the profit from one of the fattest jobs in state politics. Sheriffs are not entitled, it holds, to make a profit from feeding prisoners.

Legislators tried unsuccessfully for years to keep Sheriffs from collecting more than they spent for feeding prisoners. The supreme court decision came on an appeal from Sheriff Fred Kohler of Cleveland, who resisted a Cuyahoga county court decision dictating a county jail menu. Prisoners had charged they were underfed.

The sheriff's job, because of the decision, no longer will be sought as the county political slum. State law allowed sheriffs 45 cents a day for feeding each prisoner. The actual, daily cost in some jails was estimated at 12 to 15 cents a day. The sheriff pocketed the difference, and in a county of 400,000, the office was held to be worth \$20,000 to \$25,000 a year. The salary in counties of such size, is \$4,500.
