The total catch this year was 132,672 barrels, valued at \$387,095. The industry was hampered this season by the mild weather, fishermen being obliged to salt much of the catch.

MIXED MARRIAGES MUST BE ENDED

MONTEAL, January 18.—Canon Gauthier, Cure of St. James's cathedral, today announced from the altar that no fewer than fifteen applications for authorization of mixed marriages between Catholics and Protestants had been made to Archbishop Bruchesi since his famous interdiction of this practice a few weeks ago.

Every one of these had been turned down by His Grace, Canon Gauthier stated. Of this number, Canon Gauthier announced that twelve had come from persons of low social status in the community.

A THRILLING TALE OF THE SEA

Terrible Hardships Suffered By The Crew Of A Steamer Wrecked Near Cape Race-- Were Nearly Frozen

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., January 18.—The particulars of the remarkable escape from death and the story of the privations endured by the crew of the British steamer Tolesby, which was wrecked ten miles west of Cape Race on Monday, were learned from the men who arrived here today.

Three boats were put out over the sides, but all were smashed to pieces. The crew then constructed rafts from spars, and after a hard struggle with the big billows, succeeded in landing on a narrow stony beach in a cove at the foot of the cliff, a solid wall of rock, 500 feet high and extending for miles.

SALOONS DOOMED IN DIXIE LAND

NEW YORK, January 18.—Colonel George W. Bain, of Kentucky, said in a temperance lecture at the Twenty-third street Young men's Christian Association yesterday afternoon:

"When people say it is impossible to quit drinking, I feel that we are doing it down South. I can remember the time, twenty years ago, when the sky of the South was black with the smoke of distilleries and there was a saloon on every corner in every town, and at that time my life was threatened when I was delivering temperance lectures, but now I can speak anywhere in Kentucky and in five years there won't be a legalized saloon in all the Southland."
