**CIVIC ELECTION**

In pursuance of an Act of the General Assembly of this Island, made and passed in the 11th year of the reign of Her present Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 12, intituled "The City of Charlottetown Incorporation Act," and of the Act amending the same, 55 Vic. Can. 10, intituled "An Act to amend the City of Charlottetown Incorporation Act."

I do hereby give Public Notice that an election of a Mayor for the said City, and of one person to serve as a Common Councilman in the City Council for each of the Wards Number 1, 2, 3, 4, and 5, and of two persons to serve as Common Councilmen in the said Council for Ward No. 4, of said City, and of three persons to serve as Common Councilmen in the said Council for Ward No. 5, in the said City, being in all a Mayor and eight Common Councilmen, representing the City as follows:

At Ward 4, at or near the carriage shop of P. L. Lavoie & Son, on Great George Street.

And at the said Election the Poll will be opened at NINE O'clock in the afternoon and will continue open until FIVE O'clock in the afternoon of the day.

**Another Instance of Kruger's Wisdom.**

Sells Mine Shares to Foreigners and Sows the Seed of Future Trouble for England.

LONDON, January 30.—Sir Alfred Milner has issued a proclamation declaring that no fines, forfeitures or incumbrances on the Transvaal mines incurred since October 10, will be recognized by the British government.

The Times correspondent hears from a sure source the explanation of this proclamation here. The Transvaal government has been putting up to public auction at Johannesburg and Pretoria all the mining licenses held by absentees. In many cases they have been bought by agents of France, German and Russian capitalists, who are undertaking to work the mines under conditions imposed by the Transvaal executive.

The importance of this development cannot be exaggerated, and when publicly known here it should give the group de grace to the Kaffir market. Besides, even in the remote contingency of England being victorious, she will have to deal with the governments of Russia, France and Germany in repudiating the interests carefully acquired by their subjects in the mines.

President Kruger acted under the highest expert legal advice before selling these licenses. Thus if England reaches Pretoria the mines will raise a difficulty with foreign powers, the end of which cannot be foreseen.

Dr. Leyds' present visit to Berlin is in connection with the sale of these licenses, several of the most valuable of which he himself has pawned with continental capitalistic combinations.

**How Boers Exaggerate.**

LONDON, Jan. 30.—The correspondent of the Times at Lorenzo Marquez, telegraphing yesterday says:—

"General Gourko, the Russian attaché, has arrived at Pretoria, and the French attaché, Colonel Villevois Mareuil, has left Colenso for Colenso."

"How the Boers disseminate false news has just been illustrated. Herr Pott, the Transvaal consul here, received telegrams from Pretoria, announcing the capture of 2,000 British prisoners on the Tugela. These he officially communicated to the consular authorities. It is now admitted that only 150 were captured.

"An officer who was interviewed after the capture, said he was the only officer still in action at the time of the surrender. He did not order the hoisting of the white flag, but, having been exposed in a fierce fight for eight hours, they thought that only twenty of them remained.

"Among the slain at the Tugela is Lieut. Bruzwitz, a German officer, who joined the Boers for two months ago.

"After a week of uncertainty British residents of the Transvaal have been informed that there is no desire to expel any, except a few undesirable. President Kruger, however, has given a significant warning, that if the Boers are forced to starve, the Britishers will share the same fate."
