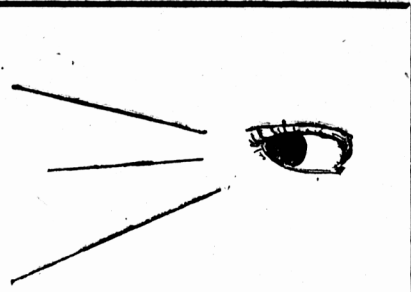

### CHURCH OF SCOTLAND PULPIT

Rev. Horace F. MacEwen, speaking in the Church of Scotland on November 23, took for his text 1 Timothy 2:5. "For there is one God, and one mediator between God and men, the man Christ Jesus; who gave himself a ransom for all to be testified in due time." Christians do not believe in polytheism—the worship of many Gods; they are not Unitarians—they do not reject the historic doctrine of the equality of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit; they are Trinitarians—they believe that Jesus Christ is very deity, equal with the Father, and that the Holy Spirit is "even the Spirit of truth which proceedeth from the Father."

The name of God used in the Old Testament 2800 times is "Elohim," a plural noun. In Genesis 1:26 it is recorded, "Let us make man in our image, after our likeness" and in the following verse, "God created man in his own image." Here is a picture of plurality in unity. God appeared in Old Testament times to various saints — Abraham, Isaac, Jacob, Isaiah, Ezekiel, Daniel, etc. He was distinctly seen by them and addressed by His sacred name, "Jehovah." The Angel of the Lord is also similarly addressed wherever we read of His appearances to men. These were appearances of Christ prior to His incarnation. When He came He was God manifest in the flesh—the word made flesh and dwelling among men. Christ is God. The Spirit too is God. Christ, the Son; and the Holy Spirit; three in One, and One in Three.

The Mediator is the man, Christ Jesus. He alone is the way to God. He said, "I am the door, by me if any man enter in he will be saved." There is no other avenue to get to God except through His Son, who is "The way, the truth and the life." For the sinner Jesus alone is his hope of eternal salvation. For the saint there is "the new and living way, which he hath consecrated for us, through the veil that is to say, his flesh." He gave His sacred body on the cross for the life of the world. The veil of the temple was rent in twain at that time, showing clearly the old economy of Judaism was past. No special priesthood was longer necessary. The believer was henceforth to be a priest and have direct access to the throne of grace, where the Mediator is now seated, ever making intercession for his own blood-bought saints.

Christ gave himself a ransom for all. He paid the price for sin by His precious Blood, "shed for many for the remission of sins." Those who believe in Him as their Saviour know what the purchase price really means, for He is the Saviour "specially of them that believe." His sacrifice only avails for those who accept Him as Lord and Saviour. It is useless for them who reject Him. He is preached now in the world, and is calling men to Himself. Believe while yet there is time and know the value of the ransom and "forgiveness of sins"; with acceptance with God through the Mediator.

In our town of office in helping our farmers to solve their problems.

I would like to refer briefly to the Provincial Agricultural Lab., which was established in June, 1945, to meet an emergency situation with respect to Pullorum disease which was prevalent among the poultry flocks in the Province at that time.

The blood-test laboratory was set up in a small room at the Provincial Sanatorium and with assistance from the Animal Research Institute at Hull, Quebec, we were able to commence blood-testing that fall on poultry flocks that were submitting hatchery eggs to the hatcheries in this Province. No mention need be made at this time as to what the poultry industry meant and means to the Agricultural industry today. When the new Prov. San was erected a wing was allotted to the Lab., consisting of nine rooms. From that small room where blood test work began in 1945, the Provincial Agricultural Laboratory has grown extensively.

Shortly after the establishment of the Laboratory in 1945, the checking of butter for yeast and mould commenced. Through the co-operation of the Dairy Superintendent, when butter samples which is produced in this Province has been very much improved through the close check work which has been done at the Lab, thus enabling the fieldmen to make proper corrections or adjustments.

The post mortem service which is rendered at the Laboratory is open to all people in the Province of Prince Edward Island experiencing difficulties in all types of live stock. All that is required of the sender is that the specimen be properly submitted to the Lab, and recommendations will be made for correction upon determination of the difficulty.

The following is the number of post mortem examinations carried on at the Lab, since Jan. 1947: 18 Poultry specimens, 23 Mink specimens, 68 Fox specimens, 19 Hog specimens.

The number of poultry specimens has been materially reduced this year principally because of the number of non-specific Pullorum reactors which

were examined last year.

There have been approximately 100,000 tests conducted on poultry blood samples and approximately 600 tests conducted for Contagious Abortion this year.

Since the Pullorum testing has commenced the work has been hampered by the troublesome non-specific reactors which have been cropping up periodically in certain poultry flocks. This Province in order to place the poultry flocks on a higher standard with respect to Pullorum, adopted a policy requiring that before a flock is eligible for hatchery purposes, two clean blood tests must be passed. The remaining part of Canada in most instances have only required single testing. It is believed now that Pullorum is at its lowest in Prince Edward Island than it has been for quite some time.

In our Soil Analysis Lab. which the government set up, we have a place where our farmers can and are having samples of their soil analyzed so that the proper treatment or type of fertilizer may be used to grow maximum crops.

Our soil is deficient in lime, this used to be rectified by application of mussel-mud. Mudding having gone out of style, our farmers have been using lime as a substitute. We inaugurated the policy of paying freight on this commodity so that farmers may obtain this very necessary corrective at a reasonable price.

In our grants to Fairs, Exhibitions and Breed Associations, we have made available funds to the raising and holding of livestock of all classes. Bonuses paid to buyers of approved rams, boars, R. O. P. cockerels and aid in inspecting and obtaining improved stock of all kinds are bringing wonderful results.

One of the most outstanding results of these educational programmes has been demonstrated in our type bacon hog in which we so far excel that of any other province. The demand for breeding stock at high prices far exceeds what our farmers have to offer.

The supplying and holding of our bacon market in Great Britain is of vital importance to us. At the present time we are faced with a serious problem, the increased cost of feeds has cut the margin of profit in this industry to the vanishing point. We could grow more grain on our farms, but as most of us also carry on other lines of farming, this would mean a decrease in hay, pasture, potatoes or other crops.

The Jones Government is pressing for an early solution of this problem and you may rest assured that we shall not let them off the terrible Jones Government has the reputation of thriving on difficulties.

### Youth Training

Youth Training Classes, which we inaugurated with financial assistance from Ottawa have proved so popular that applicants are waiting for their turn to be accepted. These are very practical courses in Blacksmithing, Carpentry, Mechanics, Home-making and Poultry and Egg Grading, and our young men and women graduating from these classes, are proving a wonderful asset to their communities in which they live.

### Farm Labour

Our Farm Labour Bureau in conjunction with Dominion officials have been busy in obtaining and distributing the extra help needed during harvesting, potato picking and other busy seasons.

We have given and intend to give the Rural Beautification Contest our utmost support. The first year of its inception we not only financed it through the Department of Agriculture, but our very busy fieldmen did all the inspecting and assisted in every way to their utmost ability. These Contests which were inaugurated and promoted through the untiring efforts of Colonel Johnson of Long River, have become a popular activity with our people and certainly add greatly to the attractiveness of the countryside.

Our Dairy Department which has always been one of our most important Departments has made great strides in improvement of the quality of butter and cheese. Inspection begins when the patron delivers his milk or cream at the factory. Samples are taken from the butter in the churn and from the storage rooms. These are submitted to the Agricultural Laboratory as mentioned before and there tested for yeast and mould, which have such a detrimental effect on the flavor and keeping quality of this product. Results of these analyses are sent to the factory operators so that they may determine the cause, and apply the remedy.

I may say that in all the branches of our Department of Agriculture, our instructors and officials have worked early and late in the interests of our farmers, who in P. E. I. as elsewhere in any civilized country are the backbone of the nation.

Hon. Dr. MacMillan states in his platform that when returned to power he will reorganize the Department of Agriculture and

increase its efficiency. Probably by the time his party is returned to power in this Province, scientific research which progresses slowly, will have made such giant strides that some re-organization may be needed.

In the autumn months of 1946, our potato growers with a large crop of excellent quality to dispose of, were faced with a surplus crop of potatoes in the U. S. A., Ontario and our other usual markets. We made representation to the Prices Support Board at Ottawa with the result that a floor price was established and a market obtained in Great Britain for three million bushels at a price which netted 88 cents per bushel to our farmers.

The Jones Government has the reputation of facing issues squarely and solving problems in a courageous manner.

### Packing House Dispute

When the large packing house companies had a dispute with their employees and a Dominion-wide strike was declared, we took over the local packing plant, and when the striking employees refused to work for the Government per hog in addition to their current wages, we put in a Controller and with men untrained in this work during the month of December, we slaughtered more hogs than were slaughtered in the corresponding month of the previous year. We also paid a bonus on hogs ten and fifteen pounds in excess of usual weights.

We held no brief for the Packers or for the workers, but we did not think that our farmers who had hogs ready for market, should lose thousands of dollars when we could do anything to help them.

I for one think that these labor and management disputes, which disrupt production and bring inconvenience and hardship to the primary producers and consumers, should be settled here in this Province by some fair tribunal which could be set up for this purpose.

Our Department of Public Works under the able supervision of Hon. Geo. Barbour passed through some difficult years, when handicapped by scarcity of building material, machinery and labor. Improved roads to marketing centres are the life lines of our farming communities and our people are demanding them. Such roads built with lower grades, higher fills and road beds, well ditched and sloped with new and stronger culverts and bridges, built to carry heavy loads, and buses cost a lot of money. A program of this nature is being carried out. We now have over two hundred miles of hard-surfaced roads in the Province, the largest per capita mileage of any province in Canada, and many more miles of road are being improved, subgraded and gravelled.

When you consider that we have upwards of 5,000 miles of roads in this Province you may realize that the problem of maintaining them is a serious one.

We built a wing to the T. B. San which increased its capacity to 100 beds. We gave largely increased grants for extra rural treatment of T.B. patients, added a large sum to Hospital grants, bought the Beech Grove Inn property, and are fitting it up for a Provincial Infirmary. We increased salaries to teachers. All these and many other expenditures which I have not time to enumerate, cost a lot of money, but are necessary if we are to keep our young people healthy and in their native Province.

### Agreement With Ottawa

Our Opposition friends hold up their hands in horror at the increased debt of the Province, but when we consider that with the financial agreement made with Ottawa we receive an increase of nearly two million in annual subsidy from Ottawa and that this financial year we will have a surplus of three-quarter million dollars, our financial situation is not as bad as it may appear. The solvency or safety of our investment outlook is judged by the interest it bears. The Jones Government borrows money at 2 1/2%. The MacMillan Government paid 6.12%.

Opposition criticism of the Financial Agreement with Ottawa will tell you that the Dominion Government takes \$3,000,000 from us in income and corporation taxes. They do not tell you that the same Liberal Government at Ottawa pays our people \$2,200,000 in Family Allowance, paid conditionally on the children attending regularly at school, which necessitates their being decently fed and clothed. The future of the nation will be in the hands of the children of today. If they are being brought up undernourished, and uneducated, we would not expect Canadians to be a self-reliant, vigorous people, though some of us may think we were born 20 years too soon.

They do not tell you that Old Age and Blind Pensions which in 1935 amounted to \$152,000, have increased to \$618,000 in 1947. There are a lot of other things they don't tell you. They just say we made a bad bargain with Ottawa.

If you think that our record is a good one, if you think that the Jones Government faced the issues of the day courageously, if you have confidence that when returned to power we will give you the efficient service we have given during the past four years, show your appreciation by marking your ballots for the Liberal candidate in the various constituencies in which you exercise your franchise.

It is conceded even by many old, live, Conservatives that the Jones Government will be returned to power on the 11th of December. In this event it is particularly important that the 1st

### Blame Stray Rope For Circus Accident

MIAMI, Fla., Nov. 21.—(AP)—A dangling, stray rope was blamed today for sending two high-wire performers hurtling 33 feet to the ground last night before 16,000 spectators at the Ringling Bros. and Barnum & Bailey circus.

The father of the performers, Charles Alzana, 65, who suffered a broken neck in attempting to break the fall, saw the danger as the act neared its climax but the warning came too late.

Harold Alzana, 31, was astride a bicycle with his sister Hilda, 16, on his shoulders. Another sister, Elsie, 24, and Harold's wife, Minnie, 28, swung from a small trapeze attached to the hubs of the bike.

The warning was heard by Hilda who tried to tell her brother as his long balancing pole struck the rope. For precious seconds, the bicycle and its riders swung precariously atop the last wire.

Then, with a collective gasp from the crowd, Harold fell with Hilda clutching his shoulders. Elsie and Minnie grabbed the bicycle still on the wire.

At his customary position on the ground beneath the wire, the father was crushed beneath the weight. Circus hands shinned up guy ropes and rescued the other two.
