TUNGSTEN MINES BEING OPERATED ON LARGE SCALE.

FREDERICTON GLEANER: The tungsten mines near Burnt Church, Northumberland County, are being operated on a large scale and are destined to become one of the most mining propositions in eastern Canada, was the statement made to The Gleaner today by Mr. Matthew Lodge, of Moncton, who is one of the leading directors of the syndicate now operating the mines.

According to Mr. Lodge the daily output of the mines is now 1,800 pounds of tungsten ore, a remarkably fine showing when it is taken into consideration that the mining plant has only been in operation for three weeks or so. The plant was assembled at Burnt Church early last summer but has only been working at its full capacity recently. At present 60 men are engaged in the work at the mines, which are being operated under the direction of Mr. A. A. Holland, a mining engineer of Montreal.

Tungsten is selling today in the English markets at 56 cents per pound and all the tungsten mined near Burnt Church is being disposed of in England. The order-in-council was passed in 1915 by the English Government commanding all tungsten mined in the British Empire, and within a few weeks ore will be shipped from the mines near Burnt Church to the United Kingdom. No shipments are sent forward until winter, as the ore can be handled more readily at that time. The tungsten mining has become so important to the residents of Maple Grove station, twelve miles from the Burnt Church mines, and situated on the National Transcontinental, that petitions have been sent to General Manager F. P. Gettings of the I.C.R. requesting that the name Maple Grove be changed to Tungsten.

Canada Had Year of Prosperity

OTTAWA, Nov. 12—The annual report of the Department of Customs for the last fiscal year shows how the world war has affected the trade of Canada. The report is based on the commerce of the country, has been re-adjusted, and the enormous growth which was noticeable last year and is still more marked this year.

The total trade of the country amounted to \$1,424,949,863, having first passed the billion-dollar mark in 1912-1913. The total is based on the returns of goods entered for consumption and exported. Based on all goods imported and exported the grand aggregate is \$1,447,378,298, the exports being \$882,872,502 and the imports \$564,505,796. The percentage of duty collected on these imports including the war tax, was 19.60. The percentage cost of collecting this duty decreased from 0.77 to 0.55. Exports to the United Kingdom rose more than one hundred per cent in the fiscal year. In the year covering the first war period, they showed a slight shrinkage but in 1915 they rose from \$117,658,893 to \$468,081,241. Exports to the U. S. have also risen, though to a less extent, the increase being from \$215,409,328 in 1915 to \$320,326,030 in 1916. Exports to France have risen from \$3,810,582 in 1914 to \$12,895,795 in 1915 and \$36,896,818 in 1916. Exports to Italy have risen multiplied users than in any previous year. Imports from the United Kingdom which touched their maximum in 1913 at \$128,749,995, dropped in 1916 to \$80,108,795. Canada also decreased her purchases in the U. S. during the fiscal year, the goods imported being \$200,000,000 less than in 1915. During the year the tonnage of new vessels built declined to 15,497, the third lowest point in history. Away
