#### VIRTUAL CIVIL WAR LOOMS IN FRANCE

##### Apprehension Caused By Situation in Alsace And Lorraine. Italian Subject Killed.

PARIS, Oct. 9.—(AP)—Police reinforcements were dispatched to Alsace-Lorraine tonight after the shooting of an Italian subject at Metz had sharpened tension between Communists and Rightists.

The Italian, Antonio Bertazzo, was wounded by unidentified assailants in a district already anxious over forthcoming Communist demonstrations and promised counter-demonstrations by Rightists.

The Italian consul at Metz identified the wounded man as a member of the Fascist party.

The possibility of a crisis within the Popular Front government of Socialist Premier Leon Blum added anxiety. The cabinet was reported determined to restrict the Communists to 10 meetings in Alsace-Lorraine, but the Communist Party's press bureau announced tonight that 52 meetings would be held over the week-end.

The Communist statement proclaimed "mobilization" of its adherents in Alsace-Lorraine to assure holding of the meetings.

There was a possibility the meetings would be raided not only by Rightists under Col. Francois de La Rocque and his "social party" but also by police.

President Lebrun himself attempted to get the Communists to call off their planned meetings and conferred with cabinet members.

#### SAYS BRITONS AIDING MADRID

ROME, Oct. 10 (Saturday) — High Italian sources said today the Italian ambassador to London had accused Britons as well as Russians of aiding the Spanish Government against the Insurgents.

The Ambassador, Dino Grandi, was said to have made the accusation at yesterday's closed session of the international non-intervention committee in London, when he denied Russia's charge that Italy along with Germany and Portugal had violated the pact by aiding the Insurgents.

Grandi, it was said in these circles, named eight British pilots who he alleged were working for the Madrid Government. The names of the aviators were not given here.

The Ambassador also was reported to have asserted the British.

#### Western Farmers In Need Of Fodder

ARCHIVE, SASK., Oct. 9.—(CP)—Feed for their cattle and horses became a serious problem tonight to farmers in a 100-square-mile area of this southern Saskatchewan district.

Pasture lands and fields destroyed by a racing prairie fire, the farmers were reported to be in immediate need of fodder.

The flames, which swept a path 20 miles long and five miles wide Thursday night, for a time menaced homes, farm buildings and school houses before being subdued after a 10-hour battle.

#### TO APPEAR IN SUPREME COURT IF REQUIRED

##### Magistrates' Judgment in Manslaughter Case Against Judge Duffy.

The decision of a preliminary hearing on a charge of manslaughter against Judge C. G. Duffy was handed down yesterday. Magistrate John F. Whear of Charlottetown read the joint decision reached by himself and Magistrate L. B. Mellich of Montague who concurred in it.

The text of the decision was as follows: "The charge, which has been the subject of our inquiry for the past two weeks or more, is 'Manslaughter.' The information alleges that the accused 'did kill and slay' one Michael Horgan and the evidence shows that the death occurred as a result of a collision on the Stanhope Road in Queens County between two motor cars, one of which was driven by the accused southwardly on his way to Charlottetown from a fishing trip, the other car was driven by the deceased's brother Thomas Horgan, Jr., who was driving home from the Covehead Road Church northwardly.

This latter car contained six passengers including the driver and in addition two others were allowed to ride by standing on each running-board. The deceased was on the left running-board and nearest to the accused's car when the collision occurred. None of the other occupants of the Horgan car sustained any injury from the collision and the evidence shows that they barely felt the shock except that John Horgan who was on the right running-board was thrown off when he ran right wheel of his car went into the ditch.

"The accident occurred at a point slightly south of Russell's Forge. The road there varies from a width of 28 to 31 feet. Measurements were taken by a government engineer and also by the R.C.M.P. The road is 28 feet wide from shoulder to shoulder in a line running under the centre of the accused's car and

#### Missing Woman Widely Sought

YARMOUTH, N.S., Oct. 9.—(CP)—Search for Mary MacGregor, wealthy Akron, Ohio, woman missing since last August, spread to Yarmouth today with the arrival of a New York detective and a Canadian National railways police official.

Miss MacGregor booked passage on a Boston-Yarmouth boat, intending to visit Ingonish, N.S. Royal Canadian Mounted Police checked the latter village and found she had never arrived there.

Her stateroom door was locked on the outside. An envelope containing her passport and a sum of money was found aboard.

#### Rev. Dr. J. Goforth, Missionary, Dies



REV. DR. GOFORTH WALLACEBERG, ONT., Oct. 9.—(CP)—Rev. Dr. Jonathan Goforth, Presbyterian missionary who spent nearly half a century in the Chinese and Manchurian mission fields, died here yesterday at the home of his son, Rev. J. F. Goforth. He was 77 years old.

Pioneer missionary of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, Rev. Mr. Goforth was sent to China in 1888 to found a mission in northern Honan Province.

Later he conducted missions throughout China, actually working in 17 of China's 22 provinces. He was closely associated for many years with the work of evangelization in Marshal Feng To Hsiang's army.

The body is to be taken to Toronto where funeral services will be held Saturday afternoon in Knox Presbyterian Church with Rev. Dr. A. B. Winchester, minister emeritus, officiating. Interment will be made in Mount Pleasant Cemetery Toronto.

For about six years Mr. Goforth had been almost totally blind, but continued his missionary work in Canada even after leaving China early in 1935 when he was recalled on furlough.

When retired by the Presbyterian general board of missions because of blindness three years ago, Dr. Goforth was quoted as saying: "My work is far from being over. I have enough invitations to speak at meetings all over the country to last me for a year. I'd go back to the Orient for another 40 years if my sight were any good."

Wallace Goforth, Montreal, is a son.

#### BRITAIN AND FRANCE REACH AGREEMENT

##### Stormy Session of Non-Intervention Committee Climaxed by Walkout of Portuguese Delegation.

PARIS, Oct. 9.—(CP-Havas) — France and Britain agreed today on a common attitude toward non-intervention in the Spanish civil war, it was learned tonight.

Former Blum lunched formally with Foreign Secretary Eden, who is enroute to London from the Riviera.

The two statesmen, it was understood, decided on the following: 1. France and Britain continue to stand for non-intervention in Spain, but insist that all powers respect the pact.

2. France and Britain are joined in attempting to avoid violent re-arrangements in the London committee meetings, but at the same time agree the committee must proceed effectively with its work.

LONDON, Oct. 9.—(AP)—Soviet Russia, threatening to withdraw from the Spanish non-intervention agreement, was understood tonight to have decided to continue cooperating for the present time.

This decision, reported by a high diplomatic authority, came after a day of stormy charges and counter-charges and the dramatic walk-out of the Portuguese delegation from the non-intervention committee meeting.

Portugal, with Germany and Italy, had been accused by Russia of aiding the Spanish insurgents in their struggle against the Madrid regime.

#### Loyalist Forces Unable To Halt Fascist Advance

##### Tension Mounts In Madrid With Acknowledged Fall Of Strategic Points In Mountains.

SEVILLE, SPAIN, Oct. 9.—(CP)—The Insurgent offensive seeking to put an end to the civil war rolled forward into Madrid province today in below-freezing weather and advanced steadily toward the capital along four almost equidistant spokes of a giant wheel.

Each of the four attacking forces pushing in from the west, the southwest, the northwest and the northeast had penetrated to within approximately 37 miles of their objective tonight.

The rim of the wheel was broken at only one point, incuena province, southeast of Madrid, through which the Government leaders were expected to flee to Catalonia when the Insurgent siege enters its final stages.

#### OCCUPY SAN MARTIN

Insurgents today occupied San Martin de Valdeiglesias, 37 miles west-southwest of Madrid, thus gaining their first grip on Madrid province, at the centre of which lies the capital.

The 37-mile radius also was achieved by three other forces, each pressing in from a different direction. These accomplished the following progress: 1. After capturing Sigüenza, 75 miles northeast of Madrid, Insurgent columns advanced almost to the gates of Guadalajara, which is only 34 miles from the capital and is believed ready to surrender without a fight.

2. Another took Navalperal de Pinares, 40 miles west-northwest of Madrid, and then drove three miles closer to the hub in preparation for an assault on Escorial a town in Madrid province 28 miles from the capital.

3. A third Insurgent force captured Almorox, 37 miles southwest of Madrid, and expected to occupy Navalcarnera, only 20 miles from the capital, by tomorrow.

#### Canny Scots Cable Typical Message

WASHINGTON, Oct. 9.—(AP)—Scottish scientists cabled a one-word message to be read at ceremonies here in which a bust of Lord Kelvin, British scientist, was presented to the Smithsonian Institution.

"Congratulations," it said. English scientists sent a cable of 1,500 words. Lord Kelvin's greatest work was accomplished in his 50 years at the University of Glasgow.

#### Britain Urged To Abandon Neutrality

EDINBURGH, Oct. 9.—The Labor Party congress tonight unanimously adopted a resolution urging the British and French Government to abandon the embargo on arms to Spain if violations of the non-intervention agreement are proven.

The executive committee of the party later elected Dr. Hugh Dalton, former under-secretary for foreign affairs, to be the new chairman of the executive, and George Dallas to be vice-chairman.

#### Dwyer Seeks To End Mine Tie-up

GLACE BAY, N.S., Oct. 9.—(CP)—Hon. Michael Dwyer, Nova Scotia's Minister of Mines, will arrive in Glace Bay tomorrow to investigate the dispute which has kept No. 24 colliery idle for nearly a week.

Demanding that eight-foot cutter bars be replaced with six-foot bars "in the interests of safety", the pit's coal cutters refused to work Monday and 400 miners have not worked since.

Last night a committee appointed by the Mines Department and a delegation of miners went into the colliery to investigate alleged "unsafe working conditions."

#### SEEK TO END ARAB STRIKE

JERUSALEM, Oct. 9.—(CP)—The Arab high committee and delegates from local strike committees tonight decided to appeal to all their followers in Palestine to end the general strike which has brought disorders throughout the Holy Land for several months.

The conference approved the proposal put forward by Arab rulers of neighboring countries to call a halt to the strike pending investigation of the situation by a British Royal Commission.

#### Killed Instantly In Car Crash

SYDNEY, N. S., Oct. 9.—(CP)—One man was instantly killed and another injured tonight when their automobile crashed into a lumber truck parked on the highway near this city.

#### Royal Commission Probe Continued

DORCHESTER, N. B., Oct. 9.—(CP)—The Royal Commission investigating penitentiaries today heard another group of 25 prisoners in Dorchester Penitentiary, bringing to 50 the number heard in two days and leaving 65 more to appear before them before they proceed to Charlottetown.

#### Shirley Temple Sued For Million

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 9.—Shirley Temple, child screen star, was sued today for \$1,000,000.

Jack Hays, film producer, who brought the suit, named as co-defendants with Shirley her father and mother; Twentieth Century-Fox Film Corporation, the California Bank and the California Trust Company.

#### Women Return To Munition Factories

LONDON, Oct. 10.—(Saturday)—(CP cable)—For the first time since the Great War, women are returning to work in the munitions factories.

The official London Gazette this morning announced that women over 18 may be employed in two-day shifts filling three-inch mortar bombs in certain factories.
