RELAXED RULES FOR ENLISTMENT

MONTREAL, July 26.—In order to secure more recruits, a relaxation in the physical demands for men for active service was announced on Saturday. Hitherto the regulations have set forth that every man accepted as fit to fight the enemy must at least five feet three inches high and have a minimum chest measurement of 33½ inches. Under the regulations published on Saturday, these qualifications were modified, so that men of five feet two inches would be accepted. As chest measurements are concerned, a compromise has been put into force. For men between 18 and 30 years the minimum girth of chest has been reduced from 33½ inches to 33 inches, but this half inch has been added to men from 30 to 45 years, who in future must have a minimum chest measurement of 34 inches. It was stated by Mayor O'Donohue, of the 60th, that this modification of the regulations would make matters easier for recruiting. A great number of other ways they were acceptable. If these men will return and submit to an examination under the new regulations, there is no doubt that many of them will get through. The men are badly needed, and it is hoped that this relaxation of the standard will not only bring back the men who have been rejected on account of measurements, but also induce a number of others who have hitherto held back to volunteer. With this advantage there should be a good impetus to volunteering that will help

greatly in getting the 60th completed and other battalions recruited. Many men who were rejected especially on account of height, were keenly disappointed, and I hope to see a lot of them come back now. I know of a number who can be accepted. So far as chest measurements were concerned, it was stated that the average man who joined the forces for overseas work put on from half an inch to an inch and a half in girth within a month of joining. The steady living, with plenty of hard work, and above all scientific physical exercises, took their waists in and added to their chest measurements in a marked degree, so that it was a wise measure to ease off this requirement. DENTAL CARE ALSO. A move is also on foot which will reduce the number of men rejected for minor defects in their teeth. This has not come to a definite result yet, but it is expected that within a few days an arrangement will be made by which volunteers, otherwise unfit, but disqualified by reason of dental defects, will be given treatment to fit them for service. Wilson, O.C., 4th Division, was in Ottawa on Friday and Saturday on military business and discussed the matter, with the result that some change is likely to be made. "I discussed this business of defective teeth with the department at Ottawa," said Col. Wilson, "and pointed out the need of more work in this line. I put in a recommendation that I be allowed two dental surgeons from the Militia Council within a few for such cases, and I hope to hear that this is no mistake to think that this matter has been neglected," said Col. Wilson. "Already we have paid out several thousands of dollars for dental treatment required to fit our promising recruits. Now that dentists officers have been appointed at

Valcartier to look after the men's teeth, this has been stopped. It is to fill in this hiatus that I have recommended the appointment of two dental officers here for recruiting work and I think they would be sufficient to fill all requirements." HALF-WITTED BOYS START \$10,000 FIRE MILTON, N. S., July 28.—Fire breaking out in the lumber mill and box factory of the McLeod Pulp Company, destroyed both buildings and the cook house, early yesterday morning, and two boys are under arrest for having started the fire. The industry carried on in the buildings destroyed, has been quiet for some years with the exception of two weeks during the present year. The mill formerly belonged to Harlow and Kempton, having come recently under the control of the McLeod Pulp Company. Owing to lack of fire fighting apparatus the blaze swept through the three buildings and all were levelled to the ground and their contents destroyed, including a large amount of machinery. The loss is estimated at something over \$10,000 with some insurance. How the fire originated was at first a mystery and an investigation had been planned by the owners, but during the day two boys, one an Indian, about 10 years of age, and a half-witted Canadian, about 18 years old, admitted that they had set fire to the buildings and caused the conflagration. They had been in the custom of sleeping around the lumber piles in the vicinity of the mills during the warm weather, and are both rated by the neighbors as "good for nothings."

They were taken in custody by the police and are held in Liverpool. Whether they were led into the incendiarism or not has not yet come out.
