2—Science in biology proves alcohol a poison destructive to all living tissue.

3—Science in pathology proves that alcohol as a beverage substantially reduces resistance to disease.

4—Science in medicine proves that alcohol is a poisonous drug and not a food.

5—Science applied in life insurance proves that alcohol, taken in moderation, shortens life.

6—Science in military training proves that even under rigidly enforced moderation, alcohol reduces human endurance and skill.

7—Science in government must finally suppress alcohol as a destroyer of human life and happiness.

One ought to be increasingly glad to live in a province such as ours in which the government has accepted its responsibility towards the relation of the liquor traffic to the people, and is proceeding in the carrying out of that responsibility according to the best dictates of science. No man is worthy of citizenship in this land who carelessly and thoughtlessly, or for his own selfish ends, tries to evade the prohibition law.

**N. Y. Gangster Shot And Killed**

NEW ORLEANS, July 8—(AP.)—A man said by police to be "Big Jim" Clark, reputed New York gangster implicated in numerous instances of liquor smuggling along the Gulf coast in recent years, was shot and killed today in a gun battle on a downtown street. A wounded companion was picked up and rushed away in an automobile. Police said the wounded man was Jerry Woods, alleged bootlegger.

Walton Tompaine, 42, before whose home the shooting occurred, was taken into custody. Among the Federal indictments returned in recent months against Clark was one naming him as a participant in the syndicate operating the rum runner, I'm Alone, Canadian schooner whose sinking off the Louisiana coast in 1929 led to diplomatic exchange.

NEW ORLEANS, July 8—(By The Canadian Press)—James Clark, described here as a marine engineer, who was killed in a gun battle in New Orleans today, appeared in Superior Court here a few weeks ago to contest deportation proceedings of long standing. A Habeas Corpus motion on his behalf has been several times adjourned during the past year.

Deportation proceedings came after United States authorities sought him as a witness in I'm Alone case.

**Mrs. Barney On Witness Stand**

LONDON, July 8—(AP.)—Mrs. Elvira Dolores Barney declared on the witness stand today she had been the mistress of Thomas William Scott Stephen, whom she is accused of having murdered, and that for almost two years she supported him.

She had been anxious, she said, to keep knowledge of her mode of life from her parents. They were present in the Old Bailey Court-room as she testified.

The 26 year old defendant retained her composure on the stand until her counsel asked her about the events of the night of May 31, when she gave a party in her flat. In which Stephen was found shot to death a few hours later. Tearfully she testified Stephen was shot accidentally as they were struggling for a revolver and that before he died he kept saying: "I wish the doctor would come. I want to tell him it was an accident and not your fault."

Tomorrow Sir Patrick will conclude the case by appealing to the jury of 10 men and two women to acquit her.

The case, which is claiming wide attention was virtually concluded this afternoon after less than two days in court. There remain only the defence address and the judge's summing up.

Led by her lawyer, Mrs. Barney told of abuses at the hands of her husband, John Barney, a theatrical singer, shortly after their marriage. Then came her love affair with young Stephen—who was without work.

In addition to supporting him, the defendant said, she gave him money for gambling, and he gambled with another woman, to whom she objected.

After the May 31 party, Mrs. Barney testified, Stephen and another man accompanied her to supper for which she paid. Then she and Stephen returned to her apartment. A quarrel developed and he said he was going to leave, and she told him that if he did she would kill herself.

**THE CIRCUS HAS COME TO TOWN**



Realization early this morning succeeded anticipation. For the past few weeks circus enthusiasts have been looking forward to the coming of the Great Sells Floto Circus. Today is the feast-day for the "white top" followers, and joy and happiness will reign supreme until late tonight.

At a very early hour the lengthy circus trains arrived in the Canadian National Railroad yards. Within sixty minutes most of the circus paraphernalia was enroute to the grounds at Connolly's Field, Upper Queen St. where several hundred workmen made the herculean task appear simple. At 12 o'clock, noon, everything was in complete readiness for the afternoon and night exhibitions, which start promptly at 6 p. m. and 8 p. m.

Vast changes have been made in the Sells Floto program and members of the press staff promise an entirely new performance. European and American artists will vie for popularity in adjacent rings and stages, while comedy moments will be supplied by a contingent of over 50 famous clowns. A mammoth menagerie is also an added feature. Tickets are now on sale at Hughes Drug Store, Queen and Grafton Streets.

**Battle With Death On The High Seas**

BALTIMORE, Md., July 8—The story of a five-day battle with death, with physician and patient never nearer than 100 miles, was told here today when the Baltimore mail liner, City of Hamburg docked.

A sailor on the British freighter, Aracataca, was the patient and Dr. Vernon H. Condon, medical officer of the City of Hamburg, the physician.

The Baltimore liner was off the Grand Banks of Newfoundland when a message from the Aracataca was intercepted. The message said:

"Seaman aboard critically ill. Temperature 104 1/2. Delirious. Breath short."

Dr. Condon asked for further information and then diagnosed the ailment as pneumonia.

As both vessels were moving eastward, they were almost abreast for five days. Dr. Condon several times each day received information and prescribed for his long distance patient.

On the fifth day, this message was received:

"Patient resting well. Pulse, respiration and heart normal. Thanks for your help."

**Ferry System Will Be Changed**

FREDERICTON, N. B. July 8—The ferry system in New Brunswick will be changed and put definitely under control of the Provincial Government, Premier C. D. Richards, secretary and solicitor for the York County municipal council, told the council today. The government had subsidized most ferries to such an extent, he said, that municipalities no longer had control or authority in the matter.

**300 Take Part In Man Hunt**

BASKATON, July 8—(By The Canadian Press)—Convinced they have their quarry surrounded in a dense wood near Lintlaw, a posse of 300 persons was tonight closing in on two men who are alleged to have shot and killed Corporal Leonard V. Ralls of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police, early today.

Led by Royal Canadian Mounted Police, farmers and local peace officers are taking part in the hunt which is the biggest of its kind in the history of Saskatchewan. Additional police from all directions are rushing to the scene and aeroplanes and automobiles are being used to bring the chase to a speedy end.

Corporal Ralls was shot by two men in an automobile whom he stopped on the road at Foam Lake. He was looking for two men suspected of recent robberies and wanted to question the two in the car. As he neared the automobile which he had carefully locked by parking his own car across a bridge he was fired on and fell with a wound above the heart.

The shooting took place near the home of A. E. Baird, railway pump house man, and awakened him and his wife. They went out and found Ralls lying on the roadway. They took him to the nearest doctor and he died with the words "they've got me. They've gone east."

Within a few hours the chase was on and recruits to the posse poured in as word of the murder spread. The hunted men were seen about three o'clock in the afternoon crawling through a dense stretch of woods and the posse at once concentrated on that area. Progress was difficult owing to the rough character of the land and the denseness of the woods. Unless the bandits succeed in breaking through the lines police have thrown about

them in the darkness, however, they are almost certain to be taken soon.

**Man Hunt Is Not Successful**

BASKATON, July 8—(By The Canadian Press)—Central Saskatchewan, engaged in its most intensive man-hunt in years, searched fruitlessly today from dawn to dusk in the scrubby timbered area near Lintlaw for two men wanted for the murder of Royal Canadian Mounted Police Corporal Leonard V. Ralls.

Police and volunteers who chased the alleged killers so hard yesterday, a few hours after Ralls had been shot and killed while he was on duty, forcing them to abandon their automobile at Lintlaw and take to the woods on foot, surrounded the timber tract today and searched through many parts of it without success.

It was held certain, however, that the gunmen could not have escaped during last night or anytime today and police expect to come upon them momentarily. The fugitives, who were suspected of several robberies in small Saskatchewan towns, killed Ralls when the Corporal tried to stop their car on the highway near Foam Lake early yesterday morning.

**Liquor Destroyed**

SAINT JOHN, N. B. July 8—Customs officers today destroyed 7,000 bottles of liquor, seized on the rum-running schooner Telephone off Chance Harbor, N. B., on November 9. The cargo had been stored in a warehouse here pending prolonged litigation in police, county and supreme courts. Reverting to the Dominion in lieu of duty, the schooner will be sold by tender.
