COMMON SENSE CLOSURE.

It is extremely improbable that any immediate attempt will be made to establish the power of closure in the Canadian Parliament. In Britain where the system was introduced twenty odd years ago, the conditions were altogether different from ours.

It may be questioned whether either of our two parties in Canada really desires the introduction of closure. The Conservatives certainly do not. The Liberals, who know that at a future date they must be in opposition, are not oblivious of the fact that while closure might possibly aid them now, it would tie their hands against the time when they shall stand at the left of Mr. Speaker.

The Canadian people do not desire closure; they love free speech, and an arbitrary gag applied by force of members would almost inevitably react against the party that applied it. All the same, there is a general desire to have the discussions in Parliament shortened, and this would seem to be practicable without resort to the extreme measure of closure.

A member may speak as long as he pleases, and when the House is in committee he may also speak as often as he pleases. These conditions seem to suggest the proper remedies—first a time limit to be changed as occasion requires, by vote of the House without debate, and secondly a limit of the number of speeches which a member may deliver in committee.

With a time limit of half an hour, members would condense what they had to say, and their speeches would be much improved without eliminating any necessary or important fact or argument, and really be made better and more effective by the condensation.

It ought not to be difficult to effect a great shortening of the sessions along these lines and on principles of common sense. Such a measure would be highly satisfactory to the large majority on both sides of the House who are not talkers; it would materially reduce the cost of reporting and printing the debates and the cost of the sessions generally; it would be pleasing to the country and more satisfactory in every way than a resort to closure.

The Republican National Convention is now in session at Chicago, where it seems certain that Mr. Taft will receive the nomination.

A recent discussion in Parliament on the subject of motor cars on the Government Railways, brought on by Mr. Martin, shows that there are four of these cars on hand which cost \$11,000 each. Minister Graham tells that these cars have been in use near St. John and Halifax, and that he

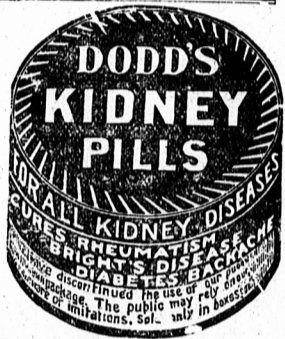
