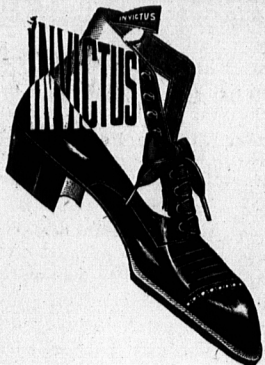

The residence of Jas. Drake, West River, was the scene of a very pretty wedding September fourth, when his daughter Blanche was united in marriage to Hector McLean of New Dominion, by the Rev. William Harrison. Norman McLean acted as groomsmen and Miss Marion Stone as bridesmaid. There were many useful wedding presents including a silver pudding dish from the Methodist choir of which the bride was a member.

As announced in the Guardian yesterday morning the marriage took place at 6.55 yesterday morning of Leslie S. MacNitt, eldest son of Leslie S. MacNitt, and Miss Marian G. Cotton, second daughter of W. L. Cotton. A number of invited guests, were present at the wedding. The ceremony was performed by the Rev. The St. John Telegraph of yesterday says, editorially: "The Tunnel—that will be Prince Edward Island's politics this year, and next, and until the trains run from the mainland into Charlottetown. Politicians who in private make light of the Island's claims are a once short-sighted and unjust. If fair play and good faith alone were consulted in this matter the Dominion Government before this day would have set about the work required to give the Islanders that which they were promised in the Confederation compact—a continuous steam communication with the mainland. If the Island is to have justice it must have the Tunnel. If it is to get justice its people must put aside the partisan differences of the day and unite in a solid party that will hold the Tunnel first and the parties second." After quoting from the Guardian on this subject The Telegraph proceeds:—"The politicians will take note of it. And politicians, ministers, business men and the Canadian public in general must quickly recognize not only the validity of the Island's claim, but the fact that the Tunnel is not only a necessity but a necessity already to be ranked among the things to be done without unreasonable delay. The Island says the cost of maintaining the various services which now give the people interrupted and unsatisfactory communication would pay interest on the cost of building the Tunnel. This assertion is one that cannot be ignored at Ottawa in this period of Canadian expansion—for if it be well founded, or even approximately correct—the Government by this fact alone would be obliged of all reasonable excuse for delay. The money benefit to the Island, to the Intercolonial, and to the country generally, would result from the Tunnel, would exceed its cost many times over in the ten years following its completion. The people of Canada are its Government. They own a vast estate. One relatively small but very valuable portion of this vast estate is cut off and allowed to languish because there is no road to it that gives sure and quick access, winter and summer. And this is wasteful husbandry."

The late Mr. Martin was well known in Strathcona and had many friends. He was manager of the White Star coal mine since it was opened about three years ago. He was a member of the Strathcona Orange Lodge. It is supposed that he died from heart failure. Besides his brothers, James and Robert, who reside in Strathcona, deceased leaves to mourn his loss two sisters, Mrs. L. G. Roberts, of Cornwall, England, and Mrs. H. McKenzie of Cavendish, Prince Edward Island. Mr. Martin was about 30 years of age and unmarried.
