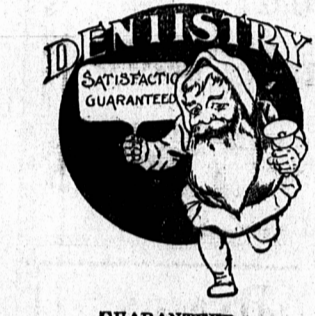

PRESENTATION.—Rev. R. G. Fulton of Chatham, who is well known in Charlottetown, was recently presented with \$100 from his congregation.

Father J. Nolan, Parish Priest of Fortune Bay, Harbor Grace Diocese, Newfoundland, came to Charlottetown by the mail special Monday morning on a visit.

IMPROVING FAST.—It is pleasing to learn that Miss Helen Burn, daughter of Mr. Edward Burn, Steward of the C. G. S. Minto, and who recently underwent an operation in the Charlottetown Hospital is fast recovering and will soon be in her usual good health.

THE STEAMERS.—The Earl Grey left Georgetown at 7 Tuesday morning and reached Pictou at 10. Her cargo consisted of ninety-seven tons freight, and forty sacks of mail besides seventeen passengers. The Minto, which left Pictou at 7 a. m., arrived in Georgetown at 10.45 with thirty-nine passengers and 110 sacks of mail.

HOME AGAIN.—Very Rev. Dr. Kelley, President of the Extension Society of the United States, reached New York on Monday from Europe, and went through to Chicago the following day. Dr. Kelley has been absent just six weeks. He was in Rome, and saw the Pope. Mr. George Hennesy, Chapel Car Superintendent, was with him. Both these gentlemen are natives of Charlottetown.

EXPORTS.—The official report on the exports from this province to other ports during the year are: From Charlottetown to Newfoundland—25 horses, 834 cattle, 653 sheep and 50 swine; from Summerside to Newfoundland—179 cattle, 235 sheep and from Bayfield to Newfoundland 21 horses, 159 cattle, 28 sheep and one hog.

WEST RIVER ICE BUSHED.—The ice in the West River is now in an absolutely safe condition even the parts always considered dangerous, around White's Point, can be travelled on with safety. Monday teams came down this river from Bonshaw, Nine Mile Creek, Long Creek and other places and the farmers all reported the ice in excellent condition. The ice is now being bushed and after this will be fit to travel on anywhere.

FAITHFUL WORKER.—On Jan. 5th there passed away at Chipman, N. B., Robert McNeill, an honored and faithful worker of the Presbyterian Church of that place. Mr. McNeill was a native of Montrose, this province, but during his early manhood settled in Chipman. For over 36 years he was a member of the Presbyterian Church of that place, and during the greater part of that time filled with singular efficiency the office of trustee. He leaves to mourn a widow, two sons and a daughter, and his death will be lamented by a large circle of friends.

FAIR ROADS.—The travelling between Pownal and Charlottetown is quite good again with the exception of some bare fields over which the road was broken when there was plenty of snow. In many places winter road masters show very poor judgment by falling to mark in the course of the winter road. After the recent thaw nothing was done in some sections to relieve the congestion of water, hence a cold plunge for the first horse that ventured over the thin ice.

THE C. C. C.—The Charlottetown Chess Club will meet as usual at the Dalton Offices, Sunnyside, Friday evening at 7.00. All chessmen welcome. At this meeting the approaching Chess Tournament will be discussed, and plans arranged for these interesting games. Last year the Tournament games commenced on March 10th and finished May 5th. It is expected the Tournament will start in February this year. A large meeting is expected Friday evening to decide matters.

THE SPEEDWAY.—The ice speedway, from the railway wharf to Hillsboro Bridge, will be the scene on Wednesday afternoon of some stirring horse contests. Charlottetown's best horses will fight for supremacy in the 2.30 pace and 3 minute trot. The entrance list is a good one, and each event should prove exciting beyond measure. Every witness ought to be present to witness the races. If they do not care to stand on the ice an excellent view may be obtained from the railway wharf where it will be comfortably warm.

FREEZING EXPERIENCE.—Mr. H. W. Rollings, the commercial man, who represents Messrs. Farquhar & Co., Ltd., in the Maritime Provinces and Newfoundland, and who has made many friends in his numerous visits to the Island, had a very trying and somewhat freezing experience recently when on a trip to Bay of Islands, Nfld. On account of the ice jam the steamer they were proceeding on could not get to port and when ten miles from land the passengers were forced to get out and walk. Although Mr. Rollings takes the experience all in good part in was quite a serious undertaking to travel this distance in the cold frost.

ACCIDENT TO HORSE.—As a result of the painful neglect of the streets, which Sunday's thaw and the subsequent frost have rendered horribly inconvenient for all traffic alike, an accident Monday evening occurred which is easy to conceive may find repetition before long. Dr. Dorsey's horse put its foot into one of the many holes that lie like pit falls for the unwary all over the roads and sustained a severe injury. For the present it cannot be said whether the animal's fet lock is fractured or not; it is believed it is only a sprain, but it is a severe hurt in any case.

THE MARKET.—The Market in Charlottetown Monday was fairly well attended. In the interior farm products were disposed of as follows: Eggs from 35 to 40 cents per dozen, butter at 30 cents per pound and fowl and chickens at from \$1 to \$1.50 per pair. There was a large attendance of butchers from the county districts who disposed of beef by the quarter, for which there was a great demand. The price of beef, by the small, inside the market was unchanged from that of last day selling from 10 to 18 cents, per pound.

HOPE RIVER.—Notwithstanding the severe snow storm of the past two weeks, the efficient mail carrier, Mr. Crewe, only missed two days on a circuit of twenty-five miles. The people of Hope River and vicinity consider it a pleasure, as well as a duty to keep the roads in a passable condition for such a courageous, regular, and obliging mail man. Citizens are pleased to have so many of the short course students home again, even if they are loaded to the muzzle with Domestic Science, Euclid and Agricultural lore.—It is regrettable that a contemporary in giving an account of the social held in Hope River Hall on Jan. 8th omitted two of the pleasing features of the program, namely: the dancing of Masters Andrew Le Claire and Joshua Dourion.—Mr. and Mrs. Andrew Glenn, who have been visiting in Bay View, the guests of Mr. and Mrs. J. Simpson left recently for Charlottetown en route to their home in Drinkwater, Sask.—Although the recent snow storms prohibited somewhat the social functions of Hope River, nevertheless the stormy week was very enjoyably spent by some of the young people, in honor of Mr. James Robinson and his daughter of Tracadie, who were the guests of Mr. and Mrs. D. V. Fleming of Bay View during the past two weeks, a Past Time Club was formed. The Club visited successively, "Sunny Hollow" the home of Mr. and Mrs. John Cullen, "Riverside Cottage," the home of Mr. and Mrs. H. H. Hogan, "Elmwood" the home of Mr. and Mrs. D. V. Fleming, and "Shady Nook" the home of Mr. W. B. Power. The programme of each evening consisted of instrumental and vocal recitations, games, dancing etc. Mr. and Mrs. Robinson left for their home on Wednesday, the 21st. Their departure put a quietus on the P. C. for the noc, which though of short duration, helped to pass in a convivial manner for its members, a time which otherwise would have been dull.
