Many Protests as McNaughton Gives Address

OTTAWA, Nov. 8.—Monday evening, Nov. 8, the packed, tense meeting of the Ottawa Branch of the Canadian Legion Gen. McNaughton received his first baptism of fire since joining the political army whose G.H.Q. is centred on Parliament Hill.

Politely received by the audience of veterans, which numbered nearly 1,000, speakers held their fire until the general, reading the same speech he made at Arnprior yesterday, came to a passage praising "our own tradition of volunteer service." Instantly there were loud cries of "no, no," "politics," "let's get the Zombies," "let that go King."

Chairman A. B. Halpenney sternly reprimanded the crowd, saying he would tolerate no interruptions. "I'll get them," the soldiers promised.

"I'm sure men and women will come forward and volunteer," he said. "The women will not." "Yes, oh my, yes," the crowd jeered. "The women will not," he said. "The women will not," he said.

Patently, the General went on, "We can proceed in two ways—'You've tried one, roared the crowd. 'Now try the other. Over and over, as he struggled to be heard there was a cheer of groans and loud boos. "With the crowd all went up when he said that men could not be driven, but must be encouraged, given sympathy, and led."

Later in the question period, which was equally hectic, questions were flung at the speaker. "What are you doing with the gang of Zombies right here in Ottawa?" "Is your voluntary plan popular in eight provinces, or in nine?" "Are you sure that the Prime Minister is not just looking to political expediency in getting you to join the Salvation Army?"

Not The Place Amid the uproar the Minister parried the shots as well as he could, answered a few of the questions. He said he favored the rear methods and always had been. He had no encyclopedic knowledge of why Britain did so well in China, and why the Zombies in Ottawa would be taken off subsistence. This type of meeting was no place to discuss such serious questions.

And so on. Chairman Halpenney, while at least 20 would-be questioners among the airmen and the aged soldiers of this war, were still waving their arms and trying for a chance to be heard, closed off the quiz.

The General was a guest, had not come to be insulted, he reminded them. Most of the crowd, good naturedly submitted to rising for "The King." They filed out, still talking, realizing that the \$4-dollar question they had sought an answer on, still hung in the air as far from a solution as ever. "The Minister is going to do with the Zombies?" It is expected that Prime Minister Mackenzie King will undertake to provide the answer in his radio address Wednesday evening.

Use Of Cigarets Shows Increase

OTTAWA, Nov. 7. (OP) — Canadian cigaret consumption now is at the rate of about 1,000 a year for every man, woman and child, and shipments to the armed forces overseas rise at the rate of about 1,000,000 in cigarettes thrown in for good measure.

A review of the tobacco industry by Norman A. MacRae, experimental physicist and technical adviser to the Prices Board, told said that withdrawals of Canadian tobaccos for consumption in 1943 provided for 11,256,544,000 cigarettes.

The proportion of Canadian raw leaf tobacco used in cigarettes now runs in excess of 96 per cent.

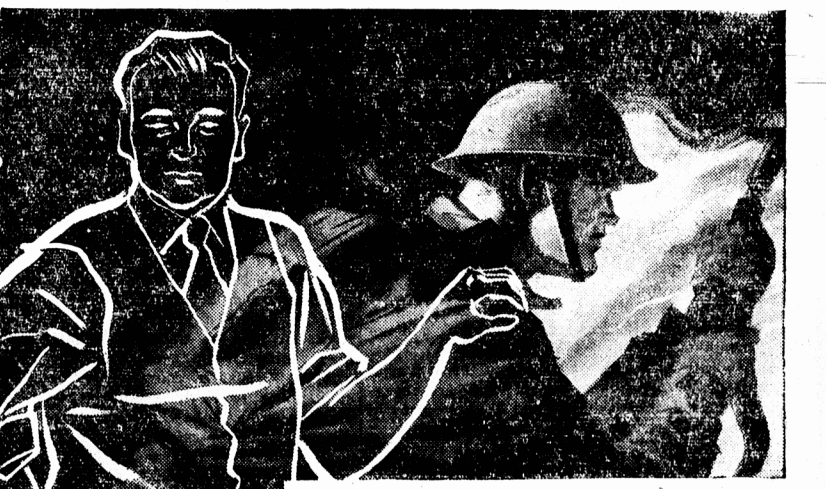
