IN MEMORIAM

MRS THOMAS PERKINS.

Peacefully passed away at the home of her nephew, Oswald Dingwell, Marie, on the 8th inst., Margaret McKay, relict of the late Thomas Perkins of Souris West, at the age of 87 years. The deceased was a daughter of the late James McKay and Jane McEachern, of St. Peter's Bay, and was the last of the family of thirteen, six boys and seven girls.

Her father, the late James McKay, came from Cathness-shire, Scotland, to Charlottetown, many years ago, where for some time he worked at his trade of a shoemaker. From there he moved to St. Peter's Bay to the farm now occupied by Mr. Kaneen, who bought it a few years ago from the heirs of his son, the late James (Joe) McKay. Of the brothers and sisters of the deceased it can be said "their graves are severed far and wide."

One sister, Sophia, was the wife of William Sanderson. Louise married Elisha Dingwell and died in West. Isabella Jane was the wife of William Dingwell, and for many years carried on a hotel business at Marie. Mary Adelaide was the wife of James H. Dingwell, John A., a brother, was a teacher and died abroad.

The only near relatives of the deceased are Oswald Dingwell, of Marie, a nephew, at whose home she spent very happily her last days; and Miss Lelia McKay, a niece, who devotedly attended to her until the last. Quiet, unassuming and ladylike, the deceased had many friends who will cherish her memory. Her remains were interred in the graveyard at Souris West beside her husband, who predeceased her many years ago.

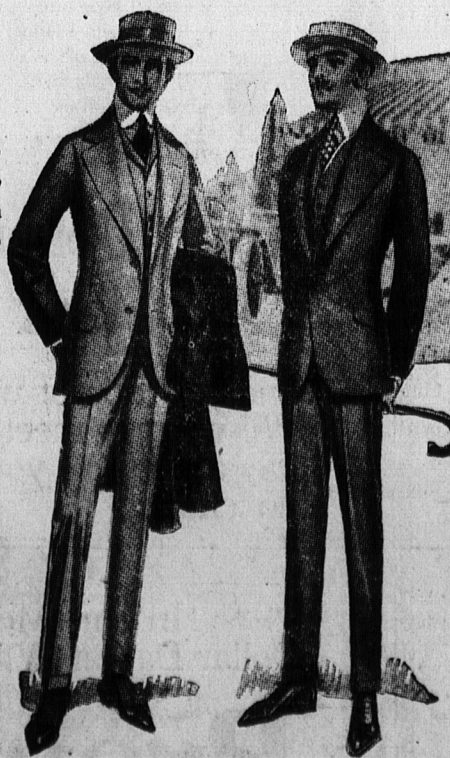
