Canadian Dollar Up 1-4 Cent In U.S.

NEW YORK, Nov. 26—Despite a relapse of 3-4 of a cent in the British pound Saturday, the English money rounded out the week's foreign exchange dealings with a net gain of about three cents in terms of the dollar.

Money dealers were apparently unwilling to take a definite stand on the sterling market until a little more light is played on the new British policy of confiscating German exports in view of persistent losses to Allied and neutral shipping.

That there were many factors to offset the effect of mine and torpedo disasters, however, was seen in the general improvement on the week.

The French franc and Belgian guilder and Swiss franc were unchanged. The Canadian dollar improved 1-4 cent to 13 1/2 per cent discount in terms of the United States dollar.

general problem in the successful fighting of this is the need for education, the speaker stated, because this is no disease which can be prevented better than cure. The principal means of raising funds for fighting this disease is the Christmas Seal Campaign.

This campaign was started by the Gyro Club of Charlottetown who carried on the scheme the audience was told and about three years ago it was felt that some formal, systematic organization was needed to further the work. The P. E. I. Tuberculosis League was formed the Premier said, composed of the Gyro Club in the city, the Women's Institute in the country, and a special committee in Summerside which was later replaced by the Catholic Women's League joined the organization later. Referring to the large number of open cases of the disease on the Island at present, the speaker appealed to the public to support this annual campaign by a donation. The idea of the League, he said, was to ask for large donations—although these would be acceptable—but rather a large number of people giving small donations.

Hon. Dr. W. J. P. MacMillan, the next speaker, congratulated the League on its great work and cited the need for the continuation of this work by quoting from the health statistics of the Dominion. It was disclosed that this Province had the highest death rate from tuberculosis in the Dominion of Canada. "This," said Dr. MacMillan, "shows how we stand in this Province and no further argument is necessary to show the need for more strenuous efforts on
