Fat women in dreadful house dresses leaned from open windows and watched the street below, or talked with each other, calling from window to window, their red elbows resting on cushions placed on the window sill. There were, at least, no slovenly figures in the boarding house windows—only blank expanses of coarse lace curtains, gray from the winter's soot and smoke. I wondered whether I would have to live in any such dreary place if I left Win? I had given up my allowance when I married, and I would not take money from Win if I went away. I wondered how much the rooms in the boarding houses cost, and once I stopped and rang a bell and asked.
