WINTER NAVIGATION OF THE RIVER ST. LAWRENCE

MONTREAL, Jan. 1.—The navigation of the St. Lawrence river for 1912 was opened today, in ideal picnic weather, considering the time of year, when the harbor commissioners tug-boat, Sir Hugh Allan, with the commissioners, harbor officials and guests aboard, made a trip down stream and back. It was the first cruise of the year, and will not be repeated for several months to come.

Not since 1878, thirty-four years ago, has a New Year's day cruise on the St. Lawrence been possible; but the long-continued mild weather of December has left the river practically clear and though loose cakes of

ice were met with and the river was frozen over close to shore to a depth of some five inches, the trip was made without any difficulty being experienced.

Usually at this time of the year the St. Lawrence is covered with a thick sheet of ice from bank to bank, even the swiftest currents having surrendered to the frost.

\$1,000,000 FIRE IN OHIO TOWN.

WASHINGTON COURT HOUSE, Ohio, Jan. 1.—A fire, which originated in the basement of a department store, wiped out a large portion of the business district of this city tonight. The total loss was \$1,000,000. Special trains from Columbus and Wilmington brought fire companies and apparatus in response to appeals from this city. The Columbus train made a run of a mile a minute, arriving at 11.15. Prior to the arrival of the out of town aid the entire city business district seemed to be doomed. The buildings so far destroyed are:
