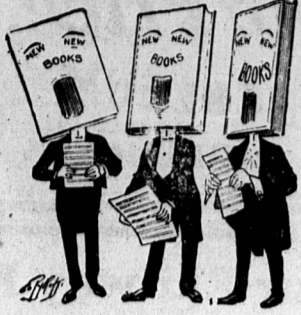

Brother Of N. Y. Police Head Is Held In Slaying

CORNING, N. Y., Dec. 14.-Information leading to the arrest of Michael Enright, 64, in connection with the slaying of Timothy Shea, of Campbell, is being checked by District Attorney Guy W. Cheney. Enright is a brother of Richard E. Enright, police commissioner of New York City, on whose farm Shea was slain, Wednesday night or early Thursday morning. He is being held pending the decision of the prosecutor. Michael was temporarily in charge of the Enright farm, during the absence of another brother, William, and he admits having had drinks with Shea. When arrested there was bloodstains on his clothing, and an axe covered with blood was found leaning against the house.

The newly married couple left immediately after the ceremony for New York, where they will visit for several days before returning to North Adams to make their home. The bride is a daughter of Mrs. W. N. Dougherty of Victoria and previous to her marriage was a graduate nurse of North Adams Hospital and has been practising her profession since graduating in June. A "Thankoffering" was given in Hamilton hall under the auspices of Hamilton auxiliary of W. M. S. on Thursday evening, Dec. 5th. Rev. Mr. Gillis presided and an interesting programme ensued. Among many good numbers may be mentioned the report given by Mrs. Lee Owen which gave a splendid idea of their particular work. The principal number on the programme was an address given by Mr. Howe of Nova Scotia, who had spent four years doing missionary work in Japan, he described the general appearance of this country, and his impression of it conveyed the idea of smallness-small people, small houses, railways, streets, fields, etc. Earthquakes and tremors are very common and frequent in Japan; consequently the people are always under a nervous strain. The Japanese are a highly civilized people and believe strongly in education as is evidenced by the attendance at their schools there being thirty thousand students enrolled in Tokyo alone. It is one of the great powers of the world and the world needs the gospel all the more. Mr. Howe pointed out that we need to intensify our friendship for and interest in these people for if we do not evangelize them, they will become a menace to the world, for they are very brilliant and potentially powerful people and as they learn Western science they will abandon their belief in Buddhism and drift into a dangerous materialism. 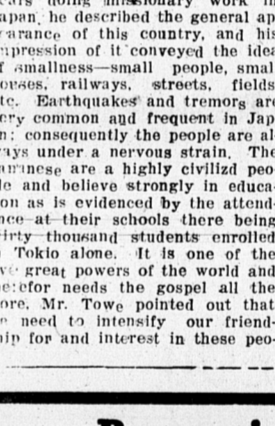
