LORD DUFFERIN'S TROUBLES.

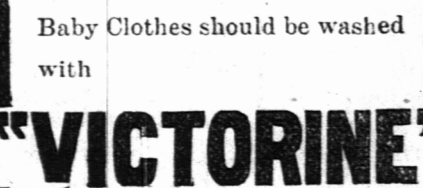
It is a long time since Lord and Lady Dufferin maintained viceregal state at Ottawa, but to any whose memories cover the entire period since the union of the Provinces the years in which Lord Dufferin was Governor will appear in brilliant relief. Even at that time, 1872-9, Lord Dufferin was no longer young. He was born at Florence in 1826. He had previously distinguished himself as a writer of books and pamphlets. He was abundantly successful in pleasing the Canadian people and afterwards rose rapidly until he was accredited as one of the great men and foremost diplomatists of the Empire. He was Ambassador to Russia in 1879-81; to Constantinople in 1881-4; Governor General of India 1884-8; Ambassador to Italy 1888-91 and afterward Ambassador to France. While he thus filled in succession so many of the highest posts in the outside service of the Empire the Canadian people watched his brilliant career with affectionate pride, almost as if Lord Dufferin was one of themselves, and he ever retained a kindly interest in the Dominion and its people.

It was therefore a matter of sorrowful interest in Canada when it was learned a year ago that Lord Dufferin's eldest son was killed in action in Ladysmith a year ago. Quite recently another son was dangerously wounded in the Boer war, and just at the time when the stricken father and mother were setting out to visit him in that distant land came the collapse of a great mining company of which Lord Dufferin was the head, and carried down with it a dozen or more related mining and financial concerns. The cable reports attach no blame to him in the matter, but there had been in the past considerable discussion in the British press as to the propriety of titled persons lending their names for the presidency or directorates of financial ventures of which they could have no very intimate knowledge.

In this case the company in question had purchased what was thought to be an exceedingly valuable mining property at Cripple Creek, Colorado. The purchase was made apparently after a very thorough and complete investigation, but in the work of development afterward the president and directors appear to have been grossly deceived by false reports, the result being that the venture ended in widespread disaster. It is regrettable that Lord Dufferin should have been in any way connected with this collapse. His great and brilliant talents were not in the line of industrial or financial affairs. None the less the incident must further tend to cloud the old age of Lord and Lady Dufferin, at a time when they are still suffering from a severe family bereavement, and the gravest concern for a wounded son. We trust that the shadow may pass away and that their closing years may partake in goodly measure of the happiness they gave and enjoyed while at the head of affairs in Canada.

Characterize Him as an Enterprising Mining Man.

If there is one man in the east doing good service in advertising the mineral resources of the Lardeau it is A. E. Welsh, of London, Ont. Mr. Welsh is managing director of the Scottish-Canadian Mining Co., operating the Rob Roy, up to the north fork of Lardeau creek. A miniature model of this district, newspaper space, ore samples, correspondence and apparently a well managed office, are the means used by this enterprising mining man.

Mr. Welsh has completed a couple of deals on Lardeau properties already this year, and has two or more on the way. His latest endeavor is to secure London capital under Canadian management, a brilliant idea if it materializes; as past experiences has taught us many lessons along these lines. Like all mining men Mr. Welsh has had many difficulties to contend with, but his chances for success in the immediate future are very encouraging. Already he has been instrumental in directing eastern men and money to this portion of the province in fact Mr. Welsh has had just about enough experience in this camp to profit by in the future. That he may succeed to the fullest extent is the Eagle's desire, as what benefits any individual or mining company in this district helps the community in general. And a little help in securing capital to develop Lardeau's mineral resources will not come amiss at the present time.
