Ritola Again Wins 10-Mile At Yonkers

YONKERS, N. Y., Nov. 3.—WILHE RITOLA, of the Finnish-American A. C. today won the national 10-mile A. A. U. championship for the fourth time, equalling the feat of his compatriot Hannes Kolehmainen. The fleet-footed Finn came from behind to save the race in the last mile and a half after a cramp had forced him to yield the pace-making position to Gonzales Moreno, an army runner, during the seventh mile. The latter finished second, 50 yards behind Ritola, while Ove Anderson, another Finnish star, was third. Ritola was clocked in 53 min. 30 1/2 sec. Record time for 10,000 meters was set by Harry Hinkel of the New York A. C. in winning the seven-mile walking title. Hinkel bettered his own former mark of 48 min. 6 sec. by hitting over the distance in 47 min. 3 sec. He then pushed ahead to cover the seven miles in 52 min. 55.45 sec. lead.
